Taft on First Ballot.

Following a conference in Washington, Representative McKinley, of Illinois, who has taken charge of the Taft headquarters at the national capital, announced that after going over the situation he felt confident that President Taft would have 780 votes at the Chicago convention.

In making his estimate Mr. McKinley refrained from giving details. It is conceded that in certain states there are at present conditions which need careful attention. Indeed it is to provide this attention to certain sore spots that the headquarters has been decided upon. The LaFollette boom has collapsed, and it is doubtful if the Wisconsin senator will have any votes except the thirty from his own state. It is probable that there may be 100, or possibly even 200, votes from the insurgent states in the West and Northwest, which will be cast for Colonel Roosevelt, and Senator Cummins will get the thirty complementary votes from Iowa. But it is conceded that Mr. Taft will have enough instructed votes to nominate him on the first ballot, and his friends will be in control of the resolutions committee, so that he will write his own platform.

Of course, the statement is merely speculative but it appears to be in accord with the present trend of sentiment toward Mr. Taft. If the present impetus of the Taft movement keeps up, there is no question but that the president will sweep the convention, as Mr. McKinley says, and carry off the reward that is deservedly his on the first ballot.

NOTICE OF SENATORIAL PRIMARY

At a meeting of the Republican Senatorial Committee for the Twelfth Senatorial District, held at Clarksburg, on the 8th day of February, A. D. 1912, it was duly ordered that a candidate for Senator from the Twelfth Senatorial District be nominated at the primary election to be held throughout the State, under the call of the Republican State Central Committee, on the 4th day of June, A.
