Urge Weeks Bill. Through the efforts of the American Game Protective and Propagation Association, a hearing on the Weeks bill for federal protection of migratory birds has been secured for March 6 before the House committee on agriculture at Washington, D. C.

Although the matter of federal protection of migrants has been agitated for years, it has never before been given a hearing, and it is extremely important that all those interested in the measure should take advantage of this opportunity and go to Washington to urge the passage of the bill.

Since many states refuse, or are unable to protect the birds during the breeding season, the only way they can be saved from extermination is for the national government to step in.

Dr. Wilson's Duplicity. Recent incidents have tended to expose the duplicity of Woodrow Wilson, his dual nature as it were. Dr. Wilson appears to have been perfectly willing to accept money from a trust magnate to further his campaign for the presidential nomination, provided the public did not find it out.

It is current that Dr. Wilson has ample campaign funds now. There is some solicitation on the part of his competitors for the nomination as to where the money is coming from. Dr. Wilson may be a beneficiary of Wall Street at this time, while pretending to be against that organization.

An Arbitrary Notice. The Democratic executive committee of this county has served arbitrary notice on the rank and file of the party in the county to line up for Woodrow Wilson for the presidential nomination.

Action like this by the Republican State Committee or any other Republican committee in the past, was denounced by the Democratic press as bossism, and it would be today. However, it is a case of another kind of axe going now and that press gives its approval, or at least makes no protest.

seems very much out of place as his view of the presidential contest and his choice for the nomination may not be possessed by the rank and file of the party. So far as has been learned, there had been no census taken of the will of the Democrats of the county previous to the committee meeting.

Great Road Activity. Even with a high-powered automobile that could keep up a pace of ninety miles a day indefinitely, it would take a man more than sixty-five years to cover all the public roads in the United States.

"The investigation just concluded," said Director Page, in an interview, "shows conclusively that the movement for the improvement of public highways has obtained a firm grip on the country. The percentage of roads which were really improved, amounted to 7.14 in 1904, while in 1909, to which year statistics are now available, the percentage was 8.66.

"It is interesting to observe the growth of improved methods in road construction. For instance, the total mileage of stone roads in 1904 was 36,818, while in 1909 it was 59,237. The total mileage of gravel roads in 1904 was 109,905, while in 1909 it was only 102,870. This decrease in gravel roads, however, was due to a reclassification of roads.

State Committee Fair. There is no disposition on the part of the Republican State Committee to transcend its powers or to deprive the rank and file of the Republican party from freely expressing their choice for nominations for public offices from the highest to the lowest.

The committee ordered a statewide primary for state nominations, and those who receive the largest number of votes will be the nominees. This is a reasonable and sane method.

In the new call for the delegate convention at Huntington, the various county committees will be delegated or asked to provide for the sending of delegates to the Huntington convention. The state committee does not assume dictation as to the county, senatorial, judicial, congressional or any other committees, but it merely suggests the advisability and expediency of those committees availing themselves of the state-wide primary election for the selection of candidates in their respective districts and circuits.

Hospital is Needed. No Indians in Alaska at all will be left in two or three generations unless the government at once takes vigorous measures to check disease among them. This is in substance the statement made in a report by surgeon in the public health and marine hospital services, who was sent on special detail to make a survey of the health conditions of southern Alaska.

Dr. Foster discusses the decrease in the native population of Alaska as follows: "Owing to the unusual lack of vital statistics in a pioneer country such as this, the exact facts on which to base an opinion have never been available and most of the statements have been mere conjectures.

"The returns of the United States Census Bureau show that in the last ten years there has been a decrease in the total Indian population approximately equal to fourteen per cent, or one and one-half per cent per year. This corresponds very closely to the rates as figured at Sitka, and they may be taken as indicating fairly correctly the rates for the whole country.
