State May Owe Sheriff Harman

Instead of His Owing It As is the Case with other Sheriffs.

CHARLESTON, Mar. 1.—If the supreme court of appeals of this state holds that sheriffs are entitled to discounts on taxes, there will be one sheriff in West Virginia that will have a claim against his county, instead of the county against the sheriff, as a result of an audit made by the tax department under the act providing for the inspection and supervision of public offices, and to establish a uniform system of public accounting.

Discrepancies were found against John G. Harman, sheriff of Grant county, during his term of office—from July 1, 1906, to July 1, 1909, but he was not given the discount on taxes as most sheriffs of the state were.

This discount, if the sheriffs are found to be entitled to it, is greater than the discrepancies found against Sheriff Harman, but if he is not entitled to it when the supreme court hands down its opinion, he will not have to return it to the county, as most other sheriffs will, but instead will only have to reimburse the state and county \$1,614.06, of which amount \$55.95 comes to the state, and \$1,558.11 to the various funds of the county.

The discrepancies found in Mr. Harman's account are mainly from two sources—interest added to taxes after the first of January, and excessive commission received on collection of taxes—he being allowed seven and one-half instead of five per cent, as provided by law. The only item of any size at all found against Mr. Harman beside commissions and interest, was an item of \$133.00, road capitulations returned belatedly, which were not charged to the sheriff in his settlement of 1907 for 1906 taxes.

Appended to the report of Chief Accountant Everett Dover, who was assisted in the audits by R. M. Kittle, Julius Scherr and J. H. Otto, was the following explanatory note regarding the discount:

"Sheriff Harman was not credited with discount in his settlements. In the event the courts hold the sheriff is entitled to credit for discount allowed to taxpayers, in addition to the legal commissions, then ex-Sheriff Harman should be credited with the above amount of discount (\$1,673.74) against the amount held to be due from him. Until after the question has been adjudicated by the courts ex-Sheriff Harman is not asked to refund to the county the amount held to be due (\$1,558.11) as said amount is less than the estimated amount of discount set out about (\$1,673.74). In the event the courts hold the sheriff is not entitled to discount then the excessive commissions and allowances are held to be due from Ex-Sheriff Harman."

In nearly all the counties of the state where the accounts of the sheriffs have been audited by the state auditors, the county courts have allowed the sheriffs discount on taxes. In no instance has the tax department made this item a finding against the official, but the amount, as near as possible, has been ascertained, and attention called to it in the audit. This position was taken because there was a difference of opinion as to just what the courts would hold. The case has been in the breast of the supreme court of appeals for some time, but no decision has been rendered. In the counties where the sheriffs have not been allowed the discount, of course, it was contended the sheriff was not entitled to it, but instead the money belonged to the county. This item, in many cases, will be larger than any discrepancy found against the sheriff, and will mean—if the supreme court decides against the sheriffs—an enormous amount of money will be turned back into the county treasury.

The audit has been filed at Petersburg, the county seat of Grant county, by Mr. Blue, and as stated above if the opinion of the higher court should favor the contention of a majority of the sheriffs and county courts, will be the first audit that a county will be indebted to the sheriff instead of the reverse.

SHERIFF CAN SELL ONLY ON LAW DAYS

"Ted" Powell returned home Friday morning from a two weeks' trip to New York and other eastern cities.

An Important Decision as to Sale of Delinquent Tax Lands.

CHARLESTON, Mar. 1.—That a sheriff has no authority to sell land for delinquent taxes at a time not fixed by the statute, is the opinion of the supreme court of appeals of this state in an opinion written by Judge Williams and handed down this week, in which the circuit court of Gilmer county was reversed and the case of Hardman, et als., vs. Brannon was remanded for new trial.

The case is one of considerable interest as the validity of many pieces of property on which taxes are delinquent, is involved, and therefore a brief history of the early stages of the case may be of interest.

Marcellus Hardman and Marcellus Stump, in his own right and as executor of Susan M. Stump, deceased, appealed from a decree of the circuit court of Gilmer county, made on the 13th day of March, 1907, dismissing their suit which had been brought for the purpose of avoiding a tax deed made to Edwin L. Brannon on the 7th of June, 1904, for a tract of ninety-five and three-fourths acres of land. Hardman acquired the land by deed from J. M. Hamilton, special commissioner, April 20, 1859, in a suit in the circuit court of Gilmer county, styled Spencer Collins, trustee, vs. Marcellus Stump and others, but did not have his deed recorded until February 13, 1902. Hardman then sold it to Susan M. Stump, but retained title to secure \$500 of the purchase price. Mrs. Stump died, testate, in May 1904, leaving Marcellus Stump her sole devisee and executor. Hardman not having recorded his
