COUNTRY SCHOOLS NEED MORE MONEY

Declares Mr. Shawkey in a Speech at the Conference.

CHARLESTON, W. Va., April 8.—"The country needs more school money and it ought to have it. It has been hobbled to enrich the city.

Containing that it was almost inconceivable that an intelligent people should employ an army of unskilled workmen to do a careful piece of work

"In every fourth country school this teacher is but a boy or girl in her teens, with limited scholarship, no special training, and teaching her first term of school. The most desolate and hopeless picture in our whole educational scheme is that of the remote country school, an unattractive box on a knotty half-acre, alongside of a muddy road, poorly heated and ventilated and supplied with rough furniture, without curtains, paint or decoration, to which we have assigned an untrained seventeen year old girl, who grows homesick and discouraged because she finds neither social nor intellectual associations to satisfy her heart's desire.

"One hundred thousand, or a little more than one-fourth of all the rural teachers of the whole country are beginners each year. Less than one out of ten of them have had normal training. It is amidst conditions such as these that the rural district supervisor renders his greatest service. He is a friend and counselor.

"District supervision also provides the board of education with expert knowledge of school affairs in their district. A president of a board in a large district declared recently 'why our supervisor has shown us where we have twenty-five schools too many. We didn't know that, we will consolidate next year.'

"The supervisor becomes a community leader in a place where leadership is sorely needed," says Mr. Shawkey. "It matters not whether it be a question of good roads, good health, good schools, good government or anything else good, he becomes a natural leader to give direction and effectiveness to the latent sentiment in favor of these things, which is always found in every community. This of course means more efficient living in the community. In West Virginia this official is proving a most helpful factor in promoting boys and girls' corn and tomato growing clubs.

"It is a conservative estimate to say that a good supervisor will increase the efficiency of the work done in the average district from 25 to 40 per cent. A district employing 50 teachers for a term of six months could therefore pay a supervisor \$100 a month for ten months and figure itself ahead at least \$2,750 on its investment. But if such a district could not increase its expenditures it might cut out the salaries of its teachers \$2.00 per month, thus providing \$100 per month for a supervisor by which the return in service for the district would without doubt be enhanced and even the teachers be better off in the long run. But such a policy should not be necessary. The country should have more money. It is an economic question and one of such grave significance as to demand the attention of the nation. Our cities cannot go on prospering without the prosperity of the country. As a matter of self-defense if

for no other reason, the cities must abandon the selfish policy which they have pursued and join hands with the country for a mutual prosperity whose Americanism is broad enough to touch every child whether black or white, in the city or in the country."
