



SALE OF \$275,000 CLARKSBURG SCHOOL DISTRICT FIVE PER CENT GOLD BONDS.

The Board of Education of Clarksburg School District, Harrison County, West Virginia, offers for sale \$275,000 in principal amount of coupon bonds, being its total issue of Building Bonds for 1911, dated September 1, 1911, each of the denomination of \$1,000, and payable on September 1, 1941, with interest from date at five per cent. per annum, payable semi-annually on March 1 and September 1, said bonds, or any of them, to be redeemable on any interest day after September 1, 1921, upon payment of the principal of the bonds to be redeemed and accrued interest. Principal and interest are payable in gold coin at the Empire National Bank, of Clarksburg,

West Virginia.

The Board of Education is authorized to levy annually a maximum special tax of 13 cents per \$100 of valuation of taxable property in Clarksburg School District to pay the interest and provide a sinking fund to discharge the principal. The District embraces the prosperous city of Clarksburg and populous suburbs adjacent to the corporate limits of the City. The valuation of the taxable property in the School District for 1911 is \$17,866,669, an increase of \$1,030,780 over the valuation of 1910.

Upon a bill filed by tax-payers to enjoin the issue of these bonds and levy of the special tax to provide for the same (Thomas Haymond et al. v. Board of Education of Clarksburg School District et al.), said bonds and special tax have been held valid

by the Circuit Court of Harrison County and the Supreme Court of Appeals of West Virginia.

The bonds will be sold to the highest bidder or bidders in writing, to be approved by the Board of Education, for cash for not less than par and accrued interest thereon from September 1, 1911.

Sealed bids in writing for all or any part of the bonds will be received until Monday, May 6, 1912, at two o'clock in the afternoon. Bids must be addressed to James N. Hess, Secretary of the Board of Education of Clarksburg School District, Clarksburg, West Virginia, indorsed "Bid for Building Bonds of 1911," and accompanied by certified check payable to the order of Board of Education for a sum equal to five per cent. of the amount of the bid. All bids will be opened publicly at the office of the

Board of Education, room 431, Empire Building, Clarksburg, West Virginia, on Monday, May 6, 1912, at two o'clock in the afternoon. The Board of Education reserves the right to reject any and all bids and to allot smaller amounts of said bonds than are bid for.
