Conductor W. C. Casaday was a business visitor in Clarksburg Saturday.




**INHERITANCE**

Tax is Paid by Wardner Estate to the State Tax Commissioner.

CHARLESTON, April 29.—The administrator of the estate of Ruth H. Brown, J. W. Gardner, of Shepherdstown, has turned over to the state tax commissioner a check for \$1,341.20 as the amount of the inheritance tax due from the estate of Ruth H. Brown, which was valued at \$28,740.11. The estate was distributed among nieces, nephews and a brother, J. M. D. Brown, the latter getting \$4,790.02, and the nieces and nephews a total of \$23,950.09. The tax on the amount that went to the brother was three per cent and to the others five per cent.

Is Presented to the Fram for Long Drift in Polar Seas.

The "Fram" is again to disappear among the icebergs of the polar seas, and this time she goes equipped for a long drift of five or six years. It is of the deepest interest to know what is the food she carries that will remain appetizing, fresh and wholesome through such a length of time, and through such extreme conditions.

A. I. With, of Christiana, Norway, a loyal Scandinavian, and an eager promoter of modern science, takes a keen interest in the coming expedition of the "Fram." Unlike many whose interest extends only to wishing the ship "good luck," Mr. With believes in a material expression of his hopes for the successful work of the "Fram" and has presented to Captain Amundson 20,000 kilos (224½ barrels) of the Washburn-Crosby "Gold Medal" flour. This is to be packed in sacks and barrels, and a part of it hermetically tinned, and will be placed on board the ship at San Francisco.

**CORPORATION IS HELD AS LIABLE**

For a Malicious Prosecution by Its Agent According to Court Decision.

CHARLESTON, April 29.—That a corporation is liable for a malicious prosecution by its agent, acting within the scope of his employment and in furtherance of his company's business, notwithstanding the company may not have expressly authorized or ratified the act, is held by the Supreme Court of Appeals in the case of Fetty, etc., vs. Huntington Loan Company, from Cabell county, in which the judgment of the lower court was affirmed in an opinion by Judge Williams.

In 1906 the plaintiff, Myron Fetty, then a boy, was employed by the American Car and Foundry Company. He procured loans from the defendant company by sale to it of his time. In assigning his time he claimed to be of age. Fetty continued to draw his pay from his employer and when the Loan Company presented its claim Fetty had quit work and there was but \$3.00 due him, which was paid to the loan company.

F. L. Doolittle, defendant's secre-

tary, had Fetty arrested on a charge of grand larceny. The warrant was issued by a justice of the peace and no indictment was returned. Fetty sued for damages and was given a verdict of \$400 in the lower court.

The court further holds that a contract purporting to be a sale or transfer of wages due, is a collateral security for a loan and that the question of whether or not it is made with intent to defraud is one for the jury to decide.
