At the San Diego Exposition to Be Selected by the States.

WOMEN WASHINGTON

SAN DIEGO, Calif., May 15.—Not only every state of the union but foreign countries also, will participate in San Diego's Panama-California exposition to be held here in 1915. The various states are appointing commissioners who will visit San Diego in the near future to select sites for their state buildings and make arrangements for exhibits. The exposition has sent its commissioners to foreign lands to invite them to participate. From reports received the nations of the world will make San Diego's exposition "international" in its scope. Throughout this land and abroad the message has been sent that San Diego wants unique exhibits so that the original plan of the exposition officials to make their fair entirely different from the San Francisco or any other exposition will be carried out. Already a car load of ancient pottery and other relics have arrived from New Mexico and Arizona where they were obtained by Dr. Edgar L. Hewett, head of the School of American Archaeology at Santa Fe, N. M. It will be remembered that the cliff dwellers' "apartment houses" are a few miles from Santa Fe. The universe will be ransacked for treasures to make San Diego's exposition—not the biggest the world has ever seen, not another Chicago fair—but the most original, romantic and instructive exposition ever held.

A tabulation by financial reporters shows the actual sum to be \$3,160,908,992. The tourists intend to visit eighteen places and be on the road four days. No business will be solicited. The object is to pay social visits to old and new customers and friends.

The big train will be modestly decorated in the colors of Pittsburg, black and yellow. It will consist of five Pullmans, two diners, one combination, one observation and one parlor reception car. While traveling telephone communication can be had from car to car. During stops communication can be had with the outside world over two telephone trunk lines. The Western Union Telegraph Company will install a special office on the train. The tourists will be pleased to have as many as desire inspect the entire train, this being especially the case with housewives who are interested in the service in the dining cars and kitchens.
