## UNCLE SAM

Will Do Some Important Things at Health Congress Next September.

WASHINGTON, May 27.—Uncle Sam, physician extraordinary and hygienist plenipotentiary to all these United States, will display all of his accomplishments, not only before the American people but before the assembled scientists of the world at the forthcoming Fifteenth International Congress on Hygiene and Demography which will be held in Washington in September. At least that is the plan which has the support not only of the officers of the Congress but President Taft and the members of his cabinet, and it is believed that efforts are now nearing fruition to secure the necessary appropriation of some \$50,000 by Congress to make possible the proper participation by the governmental departments.

Everyone knows in a more or less general way that many bureaus of the federal departments are actively engaged in the conservation of the public health, and the work of the meat inspectors, the medical inspectors of immigrants and other officers performing similar duties are frequently in the public eye. But never before has their been either reason or opportunity for showing in concentrated form all of the public health work which is accomplished by the servants of Uncle Sam in the regular routine of their daily labors.

In the exhibition on health which will be a material part of the Fifteenth International Congress, it is proposed to have exhibits from every one of the twenty-three government bureaus which deal with life-saving or health-saving for the people. The department of the treasury, for instance, desires to show what its public health and marine hospital service is doing in fifteen different lines of work. It also desires to make an exhibit of its life-saving service, with a fully equipped life-boat, apparatus and crew for demonstrations.

Similarly the war department and the navy department wish to illustrate the operations of their medical branches; the postoffice department proposes to show how pathological material is safely transmitted in mailing cases.

Representing the department of the interior there will be the exhibits by the bureaus of Indian affairs, education, and mines and the geological survey. The department of agriculture will demonstrate the activities of the bureaus of animal industry, plant industry and entomology and of the office of experiment stations. For the department of commerce and labor there will be exhibits from the bureaus of labor, census, fisheries, immigration and naturalization, and standards.

The Isthmian Canal Commission proposes to show how it has dealt with military, naval and tropical hygiene, to show the influence of tropical climate on foreigners, acclimatization, housing, dieties, clothing and the prevention of tropical disease. The Smithsonian Institution has an ambitious program; among the exhibits it proposes to make being those intended to show "the physical characteristics of pure-bred Americans, data relating to results of inter-marriage between the Indian and the white, and the normal growth of the average American child."

All of these exhibits have been planned by the inter-departmental committee which was appointed by Secretary Franklin MacVeagh, of the department of the treasury. In its request for the necessary appropriation the committee stated that "the federal bureaus are constantly in receipt of requests for exhibits with which they are often unable to comply, and that the occasion of this congress and exhibition affords a rare opportunity for the dissemination of much valuable knowledge."

## ST. LOUIS SCHOOL PATRONS' LEAGUE

Of All Races, Colors, Conditions and the Like Work for Better Schools.

WASHINGTON, D. C., May 27.—Regardless of race, creed or politics, twenty thousand men representing the business, manufacturing, and professional life of St. Louis have leagued themselves together, pledged to promote every interest pertaining to the welfare of the city's public schools and of its school children. The work accomplished by these men is observed with attention by the experts of the United States Bureau of Education.

Since the organization was established fourteen years ago, the public schools have been taken out of partisan politics and placed in charge of an independent board; school taxes have been increased, supplying funds for modern, adequate school buildings and school equipment, aggregating many thousands of dollars in value, has been contributed by the organization in fee simple to the public schools. This equipment includes almost every kind of teaching material. Among the articles given are works of reference, stereopticons, folding chairs, reflectors, pianos, statuary and pictures. One of the pictures given in this way cost \$3,500, while another was worth \$2,000. The money for these donations is raised from dues, from direct contributions, or from the proceeds of concerts or picnics.

Although these friends of the St. Louis school children are all very busy men, they find time to demonstrate their interest in education in a wide variety of ways other than these activities. By arranging appropriate exercises, they help to commemorate the national holidays, such as Lincoln's and Washington's Birthdays, and Arbor, Flag, Memorial and Independence Days, the object being the inculcation of a broad American patriotism. They also aid the principals in making the necessary arrangements for the annual school picnics, the Christmas festival and other school functions and exercises.

## PINCHOT

Visit Site of San Diego Exposition and Gives Project His Approval.

SAN DIEGO, Calif., May 27.—Declaring that the world has had a surfeit of "commercial" exhibitions and that such do no good, Gifford Pinchot, of conservation fame, put his stamp of approval on San Diego's plan to hold an "educational" exposition in 1915.

Mr. Pinchot was taken over the grounds, past the nurseries filled with millions of ferns, plants and flowers and through the forest of 50,000 growing trees, which will form a background for the scenic attractions of the exposition. Anything growing in the soil appeals to Mr. Pinchot; his towering frame of six feet two inches will bow in homage to a tiny fern or a delicate plant.

"I am amazed at the magnitude
