It is further ordered that the vote for member of House of Representatives of the United States for the said First district at the primary to be held on the 4th day of June, 1912, shall be ascertained as follows:

The Chairman and Secretary of the Republican Executive Committee in each of the aforesaid counties shall certify to the Chairman of this committee the name of each candidate for House of Representative of the United States and the number of votes cast for each candidate in their county. This committee shall meet in the city of Wheeling on the 14th day of June, 1912 at 1:00 o'clock p. m. at the office of R. M. Addeleman and shall canvass the returns of said election so certified to it and declare the result. The candidate receiving the greatest number of votes in said First Congressional District shall be declared nominated for said office and his nomination certified as required by law.

The candidate for member of the Congressional Committee of the said First district receiving the greatest number of votes in the county in which he is voted upon shall be declared a member of this Congressional Committee and shall be so certified to this committee by the Chairman of the Executive Committee of each of the aforesaid counties.

It is further ordered that all details of printing of ballots and conducting said primary election to be held on the 4th day of June, 1912, be referred to the Republican County Committee of the respective counties of said district, to be in accordance with the rules adopted by the Republican State Executive Committee for governing said primary.

It is further ordered that the Chairman and Secretary of this committee do cause this resolution to be published in at least one Republican newspaper in each of the counties of the said district once a week for four successive weeks immediately preceding the 4th day of June, 1912.
