**PENALTY**

Is Paid by Persons for Failure to Make Proper Assessment Returns.

CHARLESTON, July 5.—Because they failed to return personal property for taxation in 1911, Timothy Yoho, of Marshall county, and Adolph Schneider, of Wheeling, have been compelled to turn over to the state to be returned to the counties, a total of \$8,000. In the case of Timothy Yoho, the forfeiture amounts to \$5,000. Of this amount only a small sum goes to the state treasury. Almost all of it goes into the county, school and district funds of Marshall county.

In the case of Adolph Schneider, the forfeiture amounts to \$3,000, and with the exception of a small sum, all of it goes back into the county, school and district funds of Ohio county.

The forfeiture represents ten per cent of the personal property that was not returned for taxes by the two men, and represents the minimum amount the state tax commissioner could collect for failure of the parties to list their personal property for taxation.
