# SHERIFFS KEEP STATE INTEREST

Our State and County Funds Instead of Placing It Where It Belongs.

CHARLESTON, Aug. 30.—As a result of an audit of the accounts of ex-Sheriff D. H. Taylor and Sheriff W. M. Clemans, of Ohio county, covering a period of six years—covering the settlements made for the taxes of 1905-6-7-8-9-10, including the payments from the county treasurer to the two sheriffs, the auditors under the state tax commissioner through Chief Accountant E. A. Dover, find the state, county and various district funds of Ohio county, are entitled to a little over \$28,000 from the two sheriffs.

The findings are that ex-Sheriff D. H. Taylor, of Ohio county, owes the state \$1,103.93, and the county and district funds \$18,701.03, or a total of \$19,804.96. In addition to this amount, but not made part of the finding, is \$12,888.43 for dis-count. As in all other audits this item is not made a finding pending the adjudication of the question by the courts.

Sheriff W. M. Clemans, at the time the auditors completed their field work, owed the state \$1,685.23, and the county and district funds \$16,673.16. Since that time, however, he was either given a credit through additional allowances by the board of commissioners (permissible by law), or has paid over in cash, a total of \$11,376.07, leaving a balance still due from Sheriff Clemans of \$5,323.38.

There have been few audits made by the inspector and supervisor of public accounts, that some new phase has not been brought out by which officials have netted large sums of money. It was found in Ohio county that the sheriff's own record showed the amount of money received from banks for interest on the county and district fund, which interest was placed to the credit of the sheriff instead of the owner of the principal.

These interest items during the six years covered by the audit, total \$11,732.23, all of which went to the sheriffs—\$6,924.61 to D. D. Taylor and \$4,808.62 to W. M. Clemans.

When asked for a statement of the amount of interest received, Sheriff Clemans asked the bank to furnish a statement, and the bank's statement is made part of the report. The interest in the case of ex-sheriff Taylor, with the exception of a short period, was taken from the sheriff's ledger account.

Referring to the interest collected by the sheriffs, the report says:

"While the question of interest on deposits is not decided in this decision, (State of West Virginia, Nease vs. Smith; opinion rendered February 6, 1912), yet Judge Brannon in commenting upon the sheriff's right to interest on taxes says: "Whose money is it bearing that interest? Not the sheriff's, but money of the public. Who ever heard of any one getting interest on money not belonging to him? "It is equally true that interest received on public money deposited in a bank belongs to the public and not to the treasurer; hence the public should profit by whatever interest is received by the sheriff.

"It is the holding of this department that interest received on public moneys belongs to the public and should be credited to the fund or funds deposited.

"An examination of Sheriff Taylor's records discloses that there were, at times, public moneys in his possession as treasurer exceeding \$170,000, and that the average monthly balance on hand from January 31, 1905, to July 31, 1909, was approximately \$100,000.

"An examination of Sheriff Clemans's records disclose that there were, at times, public moneys in his possession as treasurer exceeding \$200,000, and that the average monthly balance on hand January 31, 1909, to June 30, 1911, was approximately \$90,000.


