WHAT HAPPENED SALEM?

The last legislature having submitted to a vote of the people the proposition to amend the state's constitution as to prohibit the manufacture and sale of intoxicating liquors, this question is with the people to decide. Personally I do not use liquors in any form. If nominated and elected governor of West Virginia and the prohibition amendment prevails, I shall use every means at my command to make the sale and distribution of intoxicating liquors absolutely impossible.

On the other hand, should the amendment not prevail, I shall favor a stringent local option law and license laws that will limit the right to sell liquors to persons who will fully comply with the requirements of the statutes, which should be framed with a view to rigid control and restriction of such traffic.—Dr. H.
