when it first came into complete power in the state up to 1897, when it went out of power, disclosed no act of constructive statesmanship—no act other than along the line of routine work. The last ten years of the power in the state was chiefly devoted to trying to correct the mistakes of its first ten years.

It tried to amend the laws of the state concerning taxation, and failed as it failed in every other of its few endeavors to get out of the rut. The great mineral wealth of the state, as well as all railroad and other corporate property, was either assessed for taxation at a nominal sum or not taxed at all.

In Democracy's quarter of a century of administration, taxes on the property of the people was never reduced a cent, nor were the public burdens lightened in the smallest degree. Although it boasted of great development in the state, by reason of the increase in the output of its mineral wealth and the increase in value of other forms of property, yet little of this increased value got on the tax books, except that of the farmers, the merchants and the small property owners. These lat-

est years of the administration were years of property, but by special assessments by commissioners appointed for that purpose.

Numerous and large sums were borrowed from the school fund, and in some cases neither the principal nor the interest was paid back until the attention of the people was directed to these mal-practices, by Republicans in the legislature.

Large fees were provided for certain classes of public offices, and these fees were increased from time to time for the benefit of a favored few in payment for party services.

As an instance for the incompetency, or something worse, of the Democratic administration in this state, the fact is cited that the Pullman Palace Car Company never paid a cent of taxes on its valuable property in West Virginia until it was compelled to do so under the administration of Governor Atkinson.

Constant deficits in the state treasury; frequent misappropriations of public funds; failure to write clear laws; halting in the rat and impotency to advance, are the characteristics marking the twenty-five years of dire Democratic rule in West Virginia.

AUCTION

Sale of a Rare Collection of Russian Goods is Being Held Here.

Clarksburgers are taken with Russian and German goods in a rare collection offered at auction in the McCarty building on West Main street as shown by their presence and the lively sale, which began at 10 o'clock this morning with G. C. Finly auctioneer. The sale will be for three days only.

The stock of goods come from a very wealthy estate in Russia, goods to the value of \$300,000 of which were left to Madam Wilhelm Wittgenbach, a prominent Russian woman, who brought them to this country to dispose of them. She is present at the sale. It is her plan to make annual visits to several cities, among which Clarksburg is one of the fortunate, until the collection is exhausted.

The rare and magnificent collection includes genuine Russian solid silver, hand made, hand carved and engraved, consisting of knives, forks, spoons, ladies, cups, etc. These goods are wonderful and artistic in design and workmanship, and are real antiques.

Russian hand made linens, are shown. The flax is spun by hand, the linen is wove by hand, and the decorations are all hand work.

Ladies who are interested in fine needle work should not miss the opportunity of seeing these goods.

Some other articles in stock are Russian schemovais, one beautiful Russian fur coat, Russian jewelry, solid gold muff chains, neck pieces and old fashioned brooches. The style of these goods tell their age.

There are original photographs from the great art galleries of Paris. A magnificent line of decorative ware consisting of vases, plaques, statuar and many other articles used in beautifying the home is in the collection. These goods are in imitation bronze, of a German composition, and are reproductions from the works of the most famous artists and sculptors of Europe.
