ADRID, Dec. 14.—Count Romanones, the new prime minister, has attained great political prominence despite a physical infirmity which has sapped his strength practically throughout his career. When a boy he experienced a terrible fall from a window which injured him for life. His father made a fortune as a merchant in Southern France. The son inherited his father's great business capacity and despite his devotion to politics found time to swell the wealth which was left him. The young man was educated to be a lawyer. At the age of twenty-five years he was elected to the Chamber

of Deputies from the district of Guadalupe. When a candidate for reelection he was opposed by his brother, the Viscount de Truesde, who represented the conservative party. The struggle was one of the most sensational in the later history of Spanish politics. The young count was victor and a few years later took another step up the political ladder when he was elected mayor of the city of Madrid.

Then he went into the cabinet as minister of public instruction. Served in various ministerial posts was followed by election as president of the Chamber.

The quick rise of Romanones is attributed to his conspicuous ability and his sterling character. He intends to continue the liberal and progressive policies of Canalejas, the murdered prime minister.

Advices from across the border describe incidents showing how near the surface lies the monarchist hatred of the new Republic in the country districts of Portugal which do not feel the strong hand of the constabulary and where a large part of the inhabitants have remained loyal to heart to the deposed King Manuel.

The monarchist clericals of the district of Villa Flor revolted recently seemingly through a kind of spontaneous indignation against the government. Some malcontents passing by the local government house called out derisively. The townspeople gathered and presently a movement was made toward the entrance of the building. A moment later the crowd began to sack the place. All the archives were piled in the street and burned.

Messages were sent by the Republican agents to the provincial capital and two companies of troops were sent to restore the local government and arrest the disturbers.

News of the approach of the troops reached Villa Flor and the church bells rang in alarm. The country people streamed toward the town and the military were attacked by more than a thousand peasants, some of whom used old fowling pieces, others threw stones and closed with the deploying infantry in hand to hand fighting. The troops fired repeated volleys killing eleven and wounding thirty persons. The soldiers lost three killed and ten wounded. Two hundred persons have

Although the trials of political prisoners continue daily in Lisbon, the prisons are crowded. The largest number is confined in the central prison of Lisbon, the Linqueiro, where they are lodged eight and ten in cells designed for two. The prison is dilapidated. The rain enters freely and the food is described as poor.

Father Antonio de Figueiredo, arrested March 27, 1911, is still awaiting trial. Dona Constanza Telles da Gama, daughter of the Count Cascaes has been in prison six months without a hearing. She had been collecting subscriptions for poor prisoners and was accused of conspiring.
