\$18,456,000. This total, however, involves considerable duplication, resulting from the resale or slaughter of animals which had been purchased by the farmers during the same year. The value of all the cattle (including calves) sold during 1909 represented about two-thirds of the total value of animals sold, and the value of horses sold represented about one-seventh of the total.

The census of 1909 called for the receipts from the sale of all domestic animals raised on the farms reporting and the value of those slaughtered, during 1909, which amounted, respectively, to \$6,533,000 and \$2,895,000. The item of sales is not closely comparable with that for 1909, when the inquiry covered all sales, whether of animals raised on the farms reporting or elsewhere. It is believed, however, that in many cases the returns for 1909 also included receipts from sales of animals not actually raised on the farms reporting.

**Crops.**

The total value of crops in West Virginia in 1909 was \$40,376,000. Of this amount, eighty-two per cent was contributed by crops for which the acreage as well as the value was reported, the remainder consisting of the value of by-products (straw, garden and grass seeds, etc.) derived from the same land as other crops reported, or of orchard fruits, nuts, forest products, and the like. The combined acreage of crops for which acreage was reported was 1,874,382, representing 33.9 per cent of the total improved land in farms (5,521,757 acres). Most of the remaining improved land doubtless consisted of improved pasture, land lying fallow, house and farm yards, and land occupied by orchards and vineyards, the acreage for which was not reported.

The general character of West Virginia agriculture is indicated by the fact that about two-fifths (39.6 per cent) of the total value of crops in 1909 was contributed by the cereals, about one-fifth (18.6 per cent) by hay and forage, and about one-sixth (17.3 per cent) by potatoes and other vegetables. The remainder, representing 24.5 per cent of the total, consisted mostly of forest products, fruits and nuts, and tobacco.

The value of crops in 1909 was 57.1 per cent greater than in 1899, this increase being, no doubt, due in part to higher prices. There was a decrease of 5.9 per cent in the total acreage of crops for which acreage was reported, the greatest absolute decrease being that in the acreage of cereals and the greatest absolute increase that in the acreage of hay and forage.

dozens, valued at \$8,464,000. According to the Twelfth Census reports the production of eggs in 1899 was 17,242,000 dozens, the value being \$1,875,000. The latter figures, however, are somewhat in excess of the actual returns at that census, because they include estimates made to cover those cases where the schedules reported fowls on hand without reporting the production of eggs. In order to make the returns for 1909 comparable with those published for 1899 similar estimates have been made, the method of estimate and the justification therefor being substantially the same as in the case of wool. The total production of eggs in 1909, including these estimates, was 19,159,000 dozens, valued at \$3,672,900. The total production of poultry in 1909, including estimates made on the same basis as for eggs, was 5,643,000 fowls, valued at \$2,239,000.

**Animals Sold or Slaughtered.**

The total value of domestic animals sold during 1909 was \$14,159,000 and that of animals slaughtered on farms \$4,297,000, making an aggregate of
