Edwards Confesses Duplicity.

In an authorized letter issued by E. M. Grant, chairman of the campaign headquarters of Col. William Seymour Edwards at Charleston, in the latter's fight for the United States senatorship from this state the next six years, the following declaration appears:

"As a party man Mr. Edwards has a clear right to aspire to the office. He is and always has been a Republican and a West Virginia Republican."

According to Mr. Grant, it is seen that Col. Edwards does not claim to be a member of the third party now, notwithstanding the fact that only a few weeks ago a third party conference held at Charleston passed a resolution in his favor and held him up as a member of the third party.

The Grant declaration releases the conference and all third party men in the legislature from supporting him for senator, and in that respect it may figure in the contest to the extent of eliminating Col. Edwards.

Guilty of this, Col. Edwards' fate in the present contest—defeat—will be the fate of the third party as its basis is mere selfishness and not honesty or fixity of purpose.

The Feeble-Minded Immigrant.

In spite of the best available inspection a number of insane among immigrants to this country succeed in gaining entrance, or else become insane within a comparatively short period after their arrival.

Another highly interesting feature of this test was the percentage distribution of these immigrants in relation to the country of their origin. Of the entire number examined, 600 were from southern Europe; of these, forty-six, or 7.5 per cent were recognized as defective.


