## HEMLOCK

Of the West is Pronounced a Very Fine Wood by Experts.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Feb. 21.—Western hemlock, says the department of agriculture, deserves a better opinion and more general use than it now obtains. Intrinsically it is among the most important of western woods.

The wood of western hemlock has generally been considered an inferior one chiefly because of the prejudice created by the name, which has caused it to be identified with eastern hemlock. Tests by the forest service, however, show it to have eighty-eight per cent the strength of Douglas fir, one of the country's chief construction timbers. In fact it is often mixed with Douglas fir and used for the same purposes.

The wood is practically free from pitch, has a handsome grain, takes paint and stain well, and works smoothly. It is suitable for sash and door stock, furniture, interior finish, framing, flooring, boxes, barrels and pulp. In bridges and trestles it can be used for rail but the heaviest construction. When properly prepared with preservatives, it is a valuable cross tie and pole wood.

According to Forest Service Bulletin 115, the best stands of western hemlock are found in the coast region and through the Cascade mountains. The bulletin further gives the results of tests by which the mechanical properties of western hemlock have been determined, and tells of the different uses to which the wood is adapted.

## NEW STATION

Of the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad at Salem is Opened.

SALEM, Feb. 21.—Salem's magnificent new passenger station, built by the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad Company, has been opened and is an improvement that is greatly appreciated by the townspeople generally. The station is nicely finished both outside and inside, steam heated and comfortable. The general waiting room is in the center, with ladies' room and toilet on the west end, ticket agent's office and baggage room on the east end and agents' toilet room at the side of the agent's office. The heating apparatus is in the basement.

While the station is not overly large, it is a model of coziness and will answer the purpose nicely.

The passenger station is twenty-five feet wide by seventy-five feet long, is built of pressed brick, surmounted with red tile roof and has tile floors throughout.

The new freight house has been completed about three weeks. Work on the new buildings was begun September 1.
