DR. WHITE

Will Be Retained at the Head of the Geological Department of State.

CHARLESTON, Mar. 7.—The first meeting of any of the boards of which he is a member by virtue of being governor, was attended by Governor H. D. Hatfield. It was that of the West Virginia Geological Survey, which usually holds its annual meetings about the first of March and outlines its work for the coming year. Owing to the change in administration the board did not meet until the new governor, who became a member, took the oath of office. Besides the governor the members of the board are President Thomas E. Hodges of the West Virginia University; Dean D. Sanderson, of the Agricultural College; State Treasurer E. L. Long and Dr. Archibald Moore. The board organized by electing Governor Hatfield president, and Dr. Moore secretary.

State Geologist Dr. I. C. White, of Morgantown, was re-elected state geologist, and the work for the coming year mapped out after the reading and adoption of the report showing the work and expenditures during the last year.

The board provided for the employment of expert observers to record the flow of streams of the state in order to ascertain the water power of the streams. The board also ordered the completion of the work now under way, which will require some time, and in addition ordered soil maps made of the counties of Boone, Logan and Mingo.

A new feature was the authorization of the employment of a paleontologist who will assist the geological survey and also be an assistant in geology at the university, the salary to be divided between the survey and the university.

Three assistant geologists were named, two of them have held their present position for a number of years. They are Ray Hennes, of Morgantown, and C. H. Krebs, of Charleston, and D. B. Reger, who has been made assistant geologist.
