Is to Be Followed by the Present President of France.

PARIS, Mar. 24.—President Poincare has made up his mind to spend, as fast as he receives it, every penny of his presidential income of \$240,000 a year. Then, at the end of his seven-year term he will return without savings to earning his living as a lawyer.

M. Poincare expressed this determination to be lavish in his expenditures to a lawyer friend a few days ago. His friend thought this was rather unwise and pointed out to the president that his private means were not large.

"What will you do if you do not save anything, when you are no longer president," he asked.

"Do?" answered M. Poincare. "Why, work, of course. Mr. Taft is going to become a professor at Yale; why should not I put on my advocate's gown again?"

COMING TO FAIR

To Be Held at San Francisco Are Many Denmark Residents.

(By Associated Press.)

COPENHAGEN, Mar. 24.—No nation in Europe is taking more interest in the opening of the Panama canal than Denmark.

The East Asiatic Company is making arrangements to run a direct line of steamships from Copenhagen to the Golden Gate via the canal, and Denmark expects that the new waterway will place the fruits and wines of the Pacific coast within reach of her purse, as well as provide a market for her products.

The visit to Copenhagen of the commissioners of the Panama-Pacific International Exposition aroused great local interest, and Denmark is determined to be adequately represented at the San Francisco fair. This feeling of neighborliness with the United States was increased by the recent gift of Rebbild Park to Denmark by a large group of Danish-Americans.
