### Do It Right Now.

Approval by a number of residents of the suggestions made by the Telegram regarding an immediate and satisfactory settlement of the garbage disposal problem on the part of city officials, lends emphasis to the pressing needs in that direction. Something ought to be done and done at once to rid the city in a sane, systematic manner of its garbage and filth before diseases become epidemic this summer and more lives are needlessly sacrificed to shameful negligence.

It is a matter for congratulation that Mayor Cole and several councilmen are awakened to the situation and that they are making efforts to bring about a better state of affairs. Residents will insist, however, that actual work of removing accumulated garbage shall be started at the earliest possible moment and that neither wishy-washy theories, nor further delay shall be allowed to prevent the performance of the imperative duty at hand.

The people of Clarksburg want their garbage removed and properly disposed of, and they want it done right away.

### How Webb Law Works.

The following letter written by Senator Kenyon, co-author of the Webb-Kenyon law, is so plain that there need no longer be confusion on the question as to the operation of that law:

"There is a great misconception concerning this bill. This bill does not undertake to dictate what shall be done in reference to the liquor traffic. It simply leaves it all to the states. Now, if any state forbade the use of liquor by a citizen, if such law could be sustained under the constitution, then, of course, this bill would affect the situation you speak of, but no state in the union has passed any such law and probably never will. Hence, the bill has no effect whatever upon such situation. It is simply to endeavor to stop the shipment of liquor into dry territory to be illegally used. It

would affect the business if one was shipping to bootleggers who are selling in violation of the law. It would not affect that business where one is sending liquor to individuals for their own private use.

The West Virginia law prohibits the sale or giving of liquors by clubs, societies, bootleggers and all individual under any and all circumstances, except by doctor's prescription and then only drug stores can sell it, and for sacramental purposes. As the state law makes it unlawful for these classes to operate the whiskey business, the Webb-Kenyon law prohibits liquor being shipped to them for sale or giving. The Webb law does not prohibit shipment of liquors to individuals for their personal use, for the reason that the state law does not make it unlawful for persons to drink. Persons receiving such shipments through bona-fide orders will be required to sign for it in a record book which the transportation company must keep says the state law.

### Goff's Compensation.

Discussing partisan objections made by one or two Democratic newspapers of the state about the operation of a federal law by which Senator Nathan Goff receives a pension as a retired federal judge, the (Wheeling Intelligencer) says:

"Some comment has appeared in the state press concerning the fact that Judge Nathan Goff draws a salary as a senator of the United States, and an allowance as a retired judge. In so far as the comment is ill-natured, it is unjust. Judge Goff served long enough on the federal bench to be entitled to retire with an allowance for life. This is a wise provision protecting all the members of the federal judiciary from the possible fear of want in their old age. His allowance as a retired judge is fixed and absolute, regardless of his continued activity in any other field of labor. It may in fact be looked upon as a regular part of the payment which the government makes for the services he has already rendered; and this allowance will be continued so long as Senator Goff lives without regard either to his personal needs or his future manner of employment."

The Telegram desires to add that the few feeble objections against the allowance in Senator Goff's case certainly but perhaps unwittingly favor a repugnant class distinction. It is set forth on one hand that Senator Goff ought not to receive an allowance as a retired federal judge because he receives a temporary good salary; and on the other hand because he is already wealthy and does not need the money. That is to say the federal government shall pay salaries and pensions only in accordance with the means of the beneficiary and without regard to position or service. Yet, all men are equal before the law and Senator Goff has no right nor privilege to let that law be set aside for himself or for any other individual.

### Hatfield on Kern.

Governor Hatfield has given out an interview to the press in which he handles Senator Kern, of Indiana, without gloves and in a manner that will strike the general public as being of remarkable candor and di-

rectness of speech. The governor's statement follows:

"It is not expected that paid hirelings and peanut politicians of the Kern variety will do anything other than to reflect upon state government and those in authority, who believe in law and order and who are trying to guarantee to the citizenship peace and equity under the constitution and statutes of our state.

"When Kern makes the statement that I have exceeded my authority and adopted a lawless course he states what is untrue; when he makes a statement that I have usurped the power of the courts and sentenced people to prison after court martial decision, he again speaks falsely.

"Senator Kern's statements are not in keeping with the Jeffersonian principles of good government, and if the good citizens of this country knew the real conditions that have confronted me and what has been accomplished and brought about peace out of chaos, insurrection and revolution—I am sure I would have their unanimous commendation. With knowledge of the facts, Mr. Kern should not make the statements he does.

"If the good people of West Virginia are to judge him by his utterances, I am sure that they will unanimously be of the opinion, regardless of politics, that he should lower the political flag under which he is sailing and raise in its stead the red flag of anarchy and revolution, which will surely come in this country if such characters as he are placed at the helm of our governmental affairs.

"I reiterate that I have no objection to an investigation from any source."

Governor Hatfield is to be admired by all law-abiding citizens of West Virginia for these utterances. There is no mingling of words, it is true, and the language may be rather vigorous and sharp, but fully justified by the course and remarks of Kern.

Everyone knows that Governor Hatfield gave his personal time and attention to the situation in the mining districts. He personally went among the miners, visited their camps, administered to their sick, learned conditions as they were and brought peace out of chaos and insurrection caused by agitators, some of whom were emissaries from Kern's own state whose purpose was to paralyze coal operations in West Virginia for the benefit of Indiana operators. What he did is far more commendable than the course of the critic who never visited the scene and is standing hundreds of miles away carping.

### ONE FINE PAID.

Two men were fined the usual sums this morning in police court for drunkenness. One fellow paid and was released while the other was sent out of town in default. Mayor W. H. Cole presided.

Is Elected State Warden by the Knights of Columbus of the State.

Mass was celebrated at St. Joseph's Cathedral in the morning by the Rev. Father O. H. Moyer every council in the state was represented.

At the business session held in the afternoon the election of officers resulted as follows: State deputy, Daniel B. Leonard, Parkersburg; secretary, F. C. Riester, Wheeling; treasurer, S. J. Hodges, Martinsburg; advocate, J. J. P. O'Brien, Wheeling; state warden, Thomas W. Ward, Clarksburg; state lecturer, J. H. S. Barlow, Grafton; state chaplain, the Rev. Father Flanagan, Moundsville. The next convention will be held at Parkersburg on the second Tuesday in May 1914.

Funeral services over the body of Maryla Dickson, aged three weeks, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Ross Dickson, of River Road, Point Comfort, was held at 2 o'clock Wednesday afternoon at the home and the burial was in the Greenlawn cemetery. The child died after an illness of spasms at 8 o'clock Tuesday evening.


