

Change Proposition Does Not Receive Approval of a Pennsylvania Diocese.	In This State Promises a Better Yield This Year Than That of Last.

READING, Pa., May 21.—The annual convention of the Episcopal diocese of Bethlehem today went on record as opposed to a change of name of the denomination from Protestant Episcopal to American Catholic. Bishop Talbot, who presided, endorsed a minimum salary for ministers.	WASHINGTON, D. C., May 21.—Statistics published by the department of agriculture show that on May 1, there were 231,000 acres of West Virginia farm land sowed in wheat. The condition of the crop on that date was ninety-two per cent of a perfect crop, compared with ninety per cent for the same period in the last year and eighty-nine as the ten year average for the same date. The condition of the crop was given as eighty-nine per cent, compared with eighty-nine last year and ninety for the ten-year average. Plowing and planting are reported as farther advanced than usual at this time of year.
