

Title Wish is Sought from Subscribers by the Local Committee.

SALVATION ARMY CITADEL FUND.
It is the desire of the undersigned that the deed for the property to be used by the Salvation Army shall be made to Trustees Salvation Army, incorporated. This day of 1913.

To those who have subscribed to the Salvation Army Citadel fund for the city of Clarksburg:
At a meeting of the committee held this May 27th, the undersigned were appointed to make a statement to the public, and to those subscribing to this fund, as to the present condition of affairs and of the matters involved in the investment of the funds so subscribed and the purchase of real estate for the use of the Salvation Army in its work in this city.

An amount exceeding \$15,000 has been subscribed. About \$3,000 of this subscription has been paid. The committee after consulting with representatives of the Salvation Army have agreed upon a lot to be purchased for the uses for which this fund was raised. The question now arises as to how the title to this real estate shall be taken; whether in the name of the Salvation Army, incorporated or in the name of trustees to be held by such trustees for the sole use and benefit of the Salvation Army so long as it maintains or continues its work in the city of Clarksburg.

The members of this committee, as well as the representatives of the Salvation Army, represented to subscribers of this fund, at the time the fund was being raised, that the money so raised was to be invested in real estate, and that the title to said real estate was to be taken in the name of trustees to be named for that purpose; and that the said trustees should hold said property and the title thereto for the sole use of the Salvation Army to be used by it in its work of charity and help in this city; and that when the Salvation Army ceased to so use the property, then the trustees should use it for charity, social, uplift and educational purposes, and the committee feels that the subscriptions to this fund were obtained in no small measure by and on account of such representation, and that this committee has no authority to purchase this property with the funds so raised and obtained, except upon the terms upon which such subscriptions were made as hereinabove set out. That, this committee is willing to do, but recently the Salvation Army by its representatives has made it known to the committee that it will insist that the title of the property so purchased by said funds be taken in the name of the Salvation Army, incorporated, without limitations or conditions.

We would have the subscribers to this fund understand that the committee has nothing personal in the matter and only seeks to serve to the best purpose and advantage the interests of those who have subscribed to this fund, but we do feel that if this committee should have the real estate, so purchased by this fund, conveyed to the Salvation Army according to its request it would be a substantial variance from the terms on which this fund was raised and subscribed, and that it is not with us, nor is it in our power or our disposition to modify the terms or conditions upon which this fund was subscribed, but if those subscribing such fund are willing that the title to the same be taken in the name of the Salvation Army, incorporated, and a majority so express themselves, this committee will be glad to carry out your wishes.

MINER IS KILLED BY FALL OF SLATE

In Goff Mine of the Madeira Hill-Clark Coal Company.

Sprat Amar, an Italian coal miner, was instantly killed at 8 o'clock Wednesday morning in the Goff mine of the Madeira Hill Clark Coal Company near Wilsonburg when he was caught under a fall of slate.

Amar and two fellow countrymen went into the mines together at an early hour this morning. One worked in the room above Amar and the other one worked one room below. About 8 o'clock they heard Amar give one loud shriek and the sound of falling coal. When they reached his room they saw him lying on the floor with

a large piece of slate on him. When they removed the slate they found him dead.

The body was removed to a local undertaking establishment and prepared for burial. Dr. S. M. Mason, coroner, is making an investigation in the case and if an inquest is necessary he will empanel a jury later.

The deceased man is survived by a widow and two children. He was 35 years old and lived at Glenwood.
