BONEHEAD COACHING AND ERRORS LOSE

Well Pitched Game by Siegrist in the Afternoon on Union Park Grounds.

The different managers of the baseball teams in the city league have been working hard on their teams during the last week and their work certainly showed in the two games yesterday, as two prettier games of baseball were never played on the Union Park diamond than the two yesterday. The morning game, which was hotly contested by the Bowlers and Goff Building teams finally went to the Goff Building, and the afternoon contest was won in the ninth inning by the Elks after battling for nine innings with the Scholastics.

Morning Game.
Captain Dresbach had several new men on his team yesterday and gave the Goff Building team the hardest battle it has had this season and should have won the game but lost out on account of bonehead coaching and baserunning. He had several good chances to win the game. The Goff Building had its regular team, but Lowe was wild and had difficulty in finding the plate and in many instances was compelled to throw the balls across the center of the plate to get out or bad holes. His support was also weak. Cross, who pitched for the Bowlers, was hit hard but kept his hits well scattered. The final score of the game was 5 to 3 in favor of the Goff Building.

Afternoon Game.
The afternoon game was a pitchers' battle between Siegrist and Wamsley, and if it had not been for loose support behind both pitchers the game would have ended in a one to nothing victory for the Scholastics as the Elks did not have an earned run. The Elks scored their first run in the fifth inning. Gaughan, the first man up, was out Spillsburg to Waybright. Wamsley next

up grounded to Beveredge, who booted the pill, allowing Wamsley to reach second. Crummitt was out Spillsburg to Waybright. Wamsley taking third on the play, and scoring a minute later on a passed ball. Skidmore retired the side, Siegrist to Waybright.

The Scholastics tied the score in the first half of the sixth inning when Beveredge, the first man up, drove the pill over right center field fence for a homer, after this the side was retired in easy manner. The Scholastics broke the tie in the eighth inning when Nutter dropped Beveredge's high fly, and singles by Loudon and Kennedy scored him. The Elks also made two in this inning, forging to the front with a one run lead. Crummitt was out to Spillsburg. Skidmore doubled. McGraw breezed. With two out Oldaker rolled one to short for the third out, but McMillan pooted it allowing him to reach first safe and Skidmore go to third. Oldaker stole second on the first ball pitched. Smith got his first and only hit of the game, scoring both runners. Smith was out at second, Beveredge to McMillan.

The Scholastics tied the score again in the first half of the ninth inning. Dawson, the first man up, singled but was caught napping off first. Siegrist walked, Beveredge walked. Loudon singled scoring Siegrist and Beveredge was thrown out at the plate.

The Elks won the game in the last half of the ninth inning. Nutter was safe on Spillsburg error. Gaughan walked, Wamsley bunted a pop fly but it lit safe, filling the bags. Crummitt breezed, but Skidmore came through with a single, scoring Nutter with the winning run. The Scholastics lost the game by bad coaching in the ninth inning. If the coacher on first had held Dawson on the bag, there would have been three on with one out when Loudon singled, and two would have scored with men on second and third with only one out. More games have been lost by bonehead coaching by the Scholastics than any other team in the league.
