## NINE CROPS

A Year on One Piece of Ground Are Raised by Farmers in Italy.

(SPECIAL TO THE TELEGRAM)  
MILAN, Italy, June 11.—On a dry and gravelly soil farmers of this district harvest as many as nine forage crops in a single year, according to statements made by agricultural experts to members of the American Commission on Agricultural Co-operation. The secret of the extreme fertility of this region lies in the system of irrigation, which was shown to the Americans.

In the days when Milan was a powerful independent power, the victories of the Milanese troops were celebrated not by statues, but by the more sensible idea of building canals or irrigation systems. As a consequence, the country about this city is honeycombed with irrigation ditches. About twenty years ago a plant was erected by the government to carry the sewage of the city into these ditches. From the main canals the sewage charged water is carried through the irrigation ditches into the fields.

The water spreads thinly over the fields and since it has a comparatively high temperature the fields are kept green and productive for all except about forty days of the year, despite the fact that the winters are comparatively severe. The heavy forage crop which this system affords is responsible for the great development of the dairy industry of this district. Large quantities of cheese and condensed milk are exported each year to countries which have better natural facilities for dairy products than the country about Milan.

Even the street sweepings of the city are used to increase the productivity of the neighboring farms. Bones and other refuse matter of a similar character are used in the manufacture of fertilizers, and the manure is sold to the farmers engaged in extensive agriculture, principally in raising silk worms. The fertilizer sales are insufficient to meet the expenses of operating the system. The cost balance is made up through taxes.

Abundant labor is needed to obtain the agricultural results which the statistics of this district show. But progressive methods are also depended upon. American farm machinery is frequently seen by the American visitors to northern Italy. Where such intensive cultivation is practiced it is profitable to use large quantities of fertilizers and manure. To the south of Milan where most of the irrigated lands are situated the farms are about 250 acres. The principal industry of these farms is dairying, the herds averaging from 100 to 150 cows. The milk is used in cheese making chiefly. The American commissions were shown some excellent types of co-operative dairies which are peculiarly fitted to the type of farmer in that district who can not profitably make his butter and market his produce alone as his farming is on too small a scale.

The fact must not be lost sight of that the Italian farmers are progressing and that their progress is based upon thrift. The lesson learned by the American commission in Italy has been a lesson in industry and thrift.

## THE CITY WATER TODAY

Subjoined is today's official report of the condition of the city water, in connection with which the city water works and sewerage board authorizes the following statement:

Among the chief advantages of our pure water is the control had of it. Just as a powerful horse under control is useful, so is the water we use. If the control of either be gone even for a time we are at once in great danger. New York has just learned this. Floods broke down part of its water system, uncontrolled flood water mixed with the purified water and fever at once broke out with many deaths. No surface, well water or flood water is really under control so beware of it.

## GUIDE

Of One of the National Parks is Issued by the Government.

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 11.—The principal points of interest in the newest of the great reservations that are maintained by the government for the benefit of the people are described in a circular entitled "General Information Regarding Glacier National Park, Season of 1913," just issued by the Department of the Interior. This park is situated in northern Montana, 260 miles northwest of Yellowstone Park in an air line and 447 miles by railroad. It is under the control and supervision of the secretary of the interior, who is represented in the actual administration of the park by a superintendent, assisted by a number of park rangers who patrol the reservation.

The park is bounded on the north by the Canadian line, on the east by the Blackfoot Indian reservation, and on the west and the south by the Flathead river. It has an area of about 915,000 acres and derives its name from many glaciers which are scattered throughout its area. There are about eighty glaciers between five square miles and a few acres in area. The park is a rugged mountainous region and contains over 250 lakes which are surrounded by steep and beautifully wooded mountains.

A road has been built from Belton to the foot of Lake McDonald, and from Midvale to Lake St. Mary. Beyond Lake McDonald trails extend into the greater portion of the park. A number of trips may be made from Lake McDonald in one day. One of these is to Avalanche Lake, a charming body of water which is surrounded by great cliffs and into which the melting snow pours vaccaes looking in the distance like threads of silver. Another interesting trip affording fine views of lake, mountain and forest is to the west of Lake McDonald to Trout Lake, situated in one of the most impressive of glacial cirques. Still another strip is over the steep slopes of Mount Brown to Sperry Glacier, where a camp has been established for the accommodation of the travelers. One may continue from Sperry Glacier over Gunsight Pass amidst the finest of mountain scenery to Upper St. Mary's Lake and thence to Midvale on the railroad.

This circular, which may be obtained on application to the Department of the Interior, contains information regarding the hotels, camps, a tourist map of the park, a list of magazine articles, and the rules and regulations promulgated for the government of the reservation.
