The celebration will be diversified and consist of an elegant decoration of the city by the business firms and private residences. Salem's famous concert band will furnish the principal music, with the public school orchestra of fifteen pieces. There will be a large parade at 10 a. m. through the streets of the city to the grove on Gains's hill, where public speaking and patriotic exercises will occur and an old fashioned picnic basket dinner will be served. Abundant refreshments will be served on the grounds at modest cost. The parade will consist of the band leading, the local orders, Sunday school classes, floats elaborately decorated and business firms advertising their wares. At night brilliant fire works will be displayed from the hill south of town.
