EMMIGRANTS

Are Falling Off in Number and Steamships Suffer Loss of Business.

LONDON, July 8.—There has been a remarkable falling off in emigration from Great Britain to the Australian colonies during the present year, according to the steamship companies concerned in this traffic. It is put down to the present high level of wages and the continued trade boom which give men employment in England. Despite this, however, Canada continues to get a very large number of emigrants from England and Scotland, so there are probably other causes for the decrease in the Australian figures.

This loss in traffic has been felt rather seriously by the steamship lines running to the South seas. Last year there was a tremendous demand for passage to Australia and New Zealand, and to meet this trade the steamship companies increased the accommodations on each vessel and also put on new steamers. Today the ships are running very light, even on reduced schedules.

TWO GASSERS.

On Sycamore creek, Union district, this county, the Reserve Gas Company has completed a test on the G. N. Matrin farm and has a gasser in the Gordon sand. On Coburns run, in the same district, the same company has drilled a test on the Nelson Robinson farm through the same formation and has a fair gasser.

BANKING SYSTEM OF THE GERMANS

Is Very Pleasing to the American Commission of Agricultural Co-operation.

COBLENZ, Germany, July 8.—The American Commission on Agricultural Co-operation visited this city today and saw the monument and house of Raiffeisen, founder of the German co-operative banking system that bears his name. It was a notable occasion, and Mr. David Lubin, founder of the International Institute of Agriculture at Rome, Italy, who is accompanying the commission on its investigation of agricultural co-operation and co-operative banking in fourteen European countries, delivered an address at the House of Raiffeisen. Mr. Lubin said, in part:

"We are beginning to discern with clearness that the task before us is not merely economical amelioration, but that it is higher than that. It reaches upward until it strikes the true keynote of political stability, ensuring peace and equity, not merely for the people of the United States, but political peace and equity wherever the principles underlying these doctrines shall take root."

"We hope to add our amendment to the really great work begun by Father Raiffeisen; we hope to show that the very root and secret of our

work is not merely to find amelioration for the farmer—for it would be just as charitable to find amelioration for the shoe maker and for the carpenter; the scope of our work goes beyond that. In its final analysis this work will be found to ensure not amelioration for the American farmer, but stability for the American republic."

"In speaking of Raiffeisen and his work we feel impelled to say that whatever the results, whether the American people profit by this inquiry or not, there can be no question as to this: that the people of Germany and of other European countries are gainers through the Raiffeisen system."

"It now remains to be seen whether it would be practicable to adopt this system in the United States. In this period of our inquiry it is too early for the commission to pronounce in favor of the adoption by the American people of the Raiffeisen system. Further inquiry may determine a conclusion in the affirmative; but whatever be the ultimate conclusion there is no denying the hope, the strong hope, that we may, towards the end of our inquiry be justified in setting forth in our findings if not the Raiffeisen system as in operation in Germany, then some derivation of that system."

OVERGRAZED STOCK RANGES COME BACK

As Result of Work Done by the Forest Service of the Government.

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 8.—The improved condition of the national forest range after regulated grazing is pointed to by experts of the department of agriculture as a demonstration that areas which have been severely damaged through overstocking by sheep and cattle can be brought back to their former carrying power through a system of suitably intelligent use.

When the government took charge of the live stock ranges within the national forests some of them were so badly overgrazed and otherwise injured from reckless handling of the stock that their grazing value appeared to have been almost entirely destroyed. Many of these ranges, however, have been restored and made as valuable as ever. On several of the forests results have more than justified the expectations and the range is in better condition than it ever was.

An example of this improvement is cited in the Nabo national forest, Utah. In 1908, when that forest was created, the ranges within the forest boundaries were found to be badly overgrazed and trampled because there was a lack of any control or supervision over the areas. One of the areas was at that time estimated to be capable of carrying only 3,000 head of cattle. Now, through conservative management and judicious distribution of the cattle over the ranges, and improvements in water conditions, the carrying capacity of the range has been increased until in the present grazing season nearly 8,000 head of cattle are using this particular area, and forest officers feel that a few hundred head more can be safely grazed there without injury.

THE CITY WATER TODAY

Subjoined is today's official report of the condition of the city water, in connection with which the city water works and sewerage board authorizes the following statement:
