# PLAN

Adopted by New Jersey to Take Care of Defectives is Endorsed.

SEATTLE, Wash., July 10.—The practice of some states in spending \$1,000 per capita in building state institutions for defectives was severely criticized by Alexander Johnson, general secretary of the National Conference of Charities and Corrections, before that body here this morning. "There might have been some excuse for these high costs when we contemplated merely educating a few selected feeble-minded children," said Mr. Johnson, "but when we are face to face with the problem of providing for perhaps one-half of one per cent of the whole population, we must get down to a rational basis of cost of our whole plan will fail. And yet this great number must be segregated and controlled, if we are ever to stop the dreadful increase of the defectives and insane." Mr. Johnson outlined the plan for housing and caring for defectives which has been instituted in New Jersey. In that state on November 1 last, there were 6,244 recorded cases of feeble-mindedness and epilepsy, which did not include the untested ones in the public schools. The New Jersey plan contemplates the leaving of children of school age, both the backward and the really defective, with their parents up to the time when they become socially dangerous, meanwhile attending school in special classes. Through the period of adolescence, the better grades of the feeble-minded, the imbeciles and morons, will be given care and training in state or other institutions, while the lower grades of idiots will be kept in county institutions such as almshouses, unless something better can be provided. After training the adult imbecile and morons will be provided for in county or other colonies under direct supervision, where they may be segregated and usefully employed, so that each of them may earn at least a part of his living, and many of them will be entirely self-supporting. New Jersey will also make a very definite effort to inform all her citizens of the facts relating to feeble-mindedness and epilepsy, so that all people shall understand and act, and thereby check the strain of inefficiency. "As soon as a normal people understand," said Mr. Johnson, "they will put a new law in the moral code. Just as none of you would now marry a brother or sister, so you must come to think of it as a crime and a sin—a sin against your race—to marry into a strain that shows feeble-mindedness or epilepsy in its past."
