**PRESS COMMENTS ON A RESIGNATION**

There will be a general sigh of regret go up through the state upon the resignation of Mr. Highland. He was a member of the Public Service Commission less than a month and a half, yet his value to the commission and the state has been acknowledged from every source. Mr. Highland's letter of resignation, addressed to the governor under date of June 21, is a manly, straightforward citation of actual facts, and a perusal

of it will render this well known and popular man only the stronger with his wide circle of friends. Mr. Highland was fitted in every way for the important duties he had assumed, his wide experience and brilliant successes in the business world having peculiarly equipped him for expert service on the commission, and his thorough knowledge of the affairs and industries of the state standing him well in hand in the consideration of important matters that were before the commission and that will come before it very frequently now. It is regrettable indeed that Mr. Highland could not see his way clear to remaining on this commission. — Charleston Mail.

The resignation of the Hon. Virgil L. Highland from the chairmanship of the Public Service Commission is a distinct loss to the state as he is one of the best business men the state affords. The West Virginian stated at the time of his appointment that he was capable of earning much more than the salary of \$6,000 paid him by the state in his own private business. While the salary in these positions is apparently large it is none too large to hold good men, and the brief time the law has been in effect has demonstrated the fact that it is not even high enough to hold a man like Mr. Highland. His friends were surprised that he accepted the position, knowing his own extensive private business connections, and they are not at all surprised at his resignation. He has rendered valuable service to his party in the past and no better recognition could be made of this fact than the appointment to the best paying public office in the state. While the state will lose his services the Republican party will continue to have the benefit of his good counsel and advice. Mr. Highland retires with all the honor that can be attached to the place he held and proves that he serves his party not for office but from principle. — Fairmont West Virginian.

McKinley, living near this city; and Mrs. Gideon Dillon, of Hendley, Neb. The sons are A. J. and E. Frank Findley, of this city. Mrs. Findley died Saturday afternoon at 3:30 o'clock.


