**JUPITER PLUVIUS
FOUNDS A CHURCH**

Causes Three Congregations to Unite into New One with New Name.

Jupiter Pluvius qualified as a leveler of inter-denominational barriers at Dublin, Pa., Tuesday, when three church congregations, two of which had been made homeless through a cyclone which swept the Franklin county village last summer, united with the Christian church, which owned the only remaining church edifice—and formed a new congregation.

Prior to last summer's cyclone the village's church-going population had been divided among the Christian church, the Presbyterians and the Methodists. The usual small town rivalry was prevalent. The howling winds lifted the roof from the Presbyterian edifice and completely demolished the Methodists' house of worship. The Christian church was alone untouched.

Since the Presbyterians and Methodists have been attending Sunday services at the Christian church. Old barriers were swept away, and the

arrangement was found to work so well the two churches that had been destroyed.

Decide on Union.

Trustees of the Christian church acting on instructions from their congregation, extended the use of their edifice to the two homeless congregations, to be used independently, if they so desired, but after a meeting or two the question of a permanent united organization became prominent. The result was that the members of the three congregations voted to ratify such a proposition.

The union took the name of the Congregational church, and Dr. Washington Gladden of that denomination, was invited to appear before them and explain the Congregational policy. They ratified that, also the Rev. Byron M. Long, who had been preaching to the united congregation for some months, was continued as the pastor of the new church.

Formally Recognized.

On January 26 Dr. Gladden submitted the Congregational Declaration of Belief and a church constitution, which was adopted, and Tuesday the council of churches recognized the new congregation as a Congregational church. It was launched with a charter membership of 150 members. A series of special meetings is now being conducted.

All of the Congregational churches of Columbus and those of Zanesville, Marysville, Mt. Vernon, Newark, Lockbourne and Croton were represented at the service Tuesday. Dr. Gladden was elected moderator and the Rev. F. L. Brownlee, scribe. A record of the proceedings to date was read by W. C. Walton, clerk of the church, and the constitution of the new body was offered by the Rev. Mr. Long. Addresses were made during the afternoon by visiting pastors and members of the new congregation.

In the evening the new organization was perfected and formally launched when the Rev. Dr. Gladden preached the sermon, the Rev. W. H. Woodring, of Columbus, delivered the charge to the people, and the Rev. Mr. Long extended the right hand of fellowship. The Rev. Mr. Long offered the recognition prayer.
