**BELL DEAD**  
Is Noted in Kipling's Writings and as a Bridge Builder.  
LONDON, Eng., Aug. 16.—James R. Bell, the original of Kipling's "Bridge Builder," is dead at his home here.  
Mr. Bell was a sad reminder of how the cast iron rules of the Indian civil service hamper the efficiency of some of its best members, for he was at the heyday of his power when he was arbitrarily retired at the age of 55. He was in excellent health, in the midst of some of his best achievements and willing and anxious to go on with his work, when the orders came to cease his activities.  
After his retirement Mr. Bell passed nearly every winter in India or China, where his services as a consulting engineer were welcomed. He came from a family of engineers, being the grandson of James Bremner, who floated the "Great Britain," then the largest steamer in the world, when it stranded in Mundrum Bay on its third trip across the Atlantic. Mr. Bell built some of the greatest bridges in India. Some of these structures are great engineering feats, for the designs have to provide for inundations and changes in the courses of the treacherous rivers they span.
