HEARNE ENTERS CONGRESS RACE

TO THE VOTERS OF THE FIRST CONGRESSIONAL DISTRICT:
I am a candidate for Congress to succeed the Hon. John W. Davis. I take this step at the earnest solicitation of many friends, and on account of an ambition on my part to faithfully serve all of the people in a wider field. I feel that my experience in legislative affairs in the House of Delegates and in the Senate of West Virginia renders me fit to carry out this ambition. In the past, I have labored earnestly and faithfully towards the accomplishment of progressive legislation. My efforts have assisted in the reform of our tax laws, the passage of laws tending to abolish the Fee System in the state, Uniform Public Accounting Laws, State Board of Control Law, Workmen's Compensation Act and Public Utilities Commission. I voted to ratify the federal income tax amendment and for direct vote for United States senators. I have also since given my efforts to try and secure the passage of good primary laws, which I hope may soon be enacted.

I am a Republican and expect to run on the Republican ticket, and I believe my record is such that all Republicans who earnestly desire a rehabilitation of the party can get behind me on the common ground of protection to American industry and agriculture. We should bear no malice to those who differed with us in the past, but let us all get together again. The government of nations is entrusted to the care of political parties, and in this great republic of ours, which is no exception to that general rule, the people more frequently than in other countries either endorse or defeat the party in power, as that party measures or does not measure up to the demands of the people. The Republican party, since its birth, has been a potent influence for the betterment of the nation. By its wise and beneficent policy of protection to American industry, it has built up a mighty industrial republic, of prosperous people and happy homes, and it stands steadfast today against the destruction of that great bulwark of protection. The party has continued in power the greater part of the time from Abraham Lincoln to the present day. It has always come up stronger after defeat and has always conformed itself to changed conditions; and any political organization or any other association for the benefit of mankind must constantly conform to the changes wrought by the advancement of education and civilization or it must outlive its usefulness. It requires no profound students in the philosophy of history to see that the nation is now passing through a transitional period in its history. We are already enjoying and are about to enjoy still further the fruits of a broader extension of true rule by the people in representative government. It requires wise leadership in times like these, and, in my judgment, the Republican party is still able to rise to the occasion. The nation does not demand the inaction of men who will stand without hitching, still less does it demand the ever ready tongues of blatant demagogues who appeal to passion and prejudice. Our progress must be onward and upward in dealing with the tariff, trust and sociological problems. The ability of any party to succeed on statecraft lies in its ability to quickly grasp the spirit of the age and to adapt its policies to meet changed and constantly changing conditions. Wherein the Republican party has failed in this respect, let us each of its humblest members try to make it a bigger, broader and better party than ever. We are living in a scientific era. Wise tariff revision should require exact knowledge for its proper application to schedules under consideration. I believe this exact knowledge can best be obtained by an expert and as nearly as possible non-partisan commission. "Log rolling" methods are unpopular, unscientific and unjust. Duties on wool, sugar and iron have no relation to each other, and should be laid upon their own individual merits. The present methods of framing tariff bills are all wrong and too often create commercial unrest.

The modern trusts are the outgrowth of modern industrial conditions. They should be regulated but not discouraged. Modern institutions should be regulated by modern laws, and all laws should be repealed or amended which require innumerable law suits to determine honesty of purpose.

Laws governing trusts should be conceived in a scientific spirit and enacted and enforced with a view to justice.

All business should be run with the greatest regard for the value of human life, liberty and pursuit of happiness; and whenever any association of men runs counter to the preamble of the Declaration of Independence it should be made to square with it. The Republican party has done in the past more for the benefit of labor than any other party in its protective tariffs policy and in the passage of the Workmen's Compensation Act and the laws lightening the burden of labor, and it should always be careful to regard that labor has a human character as well as being a mere commodity.

It is due to you to know where I stand, so I have gone briefly into some of these matters.

THE CITY WATER TODAY

Subjoined is today's official report of the condition of the city water, in connection with which the city water works and sewerage board authorizes the following statement:

The combatting of typhoid fever may be divided into two stages, first, getting rid of the typhoid due to a polluted water supply, and second, combatting the so-called residual or contact fever. Many cities have not progressed as far as the first stage—that of providing a pure water supply.


