CROP

Outlook in the Western Part of West Virginia Seems Very Good.

RAVENSWOOD, Sept. 5.—As the outlook for the growing crops, together with the fruit crop seems to be the chief concern of the consumers of food stuff at this time, I kept a diligent lookout through the car windows while making a short run down the Ohio river from Parkersburg to Millwood Monday.

I found the acreage in corn very large, some larger I think than I ever before saw in this territory, and while some fields of this cereal showed the effects of the severe drought, the most of it showed a good color and was well eared, and upon the whole it looked to be an average crop. I was told that in some sections farther up the river the crop was much better.

As to fruit of all kinds, a complete failure was indicated. The only apples I have seen since I left home was in an orchard a few miles north of Ravenswood, which showed a smart sprinkling of apples all over the orchard.

It is a pleasure to ride on the main line of the Ohio River road, but woe to the passengers when they transfer at Millwood for the short run up Mill creek to Ripley. It only runs one train a day each way between Ripley and Millwood. The distance is twelve miles and we were two hours making the trip Monday evening. A mixed train consisting of eight or ten freight cars, and one passenger coach. There are some stiff grades on the road and the engine would sometimes stall, then run back a mile to gather force to try it again. This was repeated three times on one grade. It was getting dark and some of the passengers became restless and hungry. Being used to such things, I was inclined to look upon the incident from a philosophical standpoint but my "better half" soon lost her equilibrium and hinted in very strong terms that she had been accorded better treatment on other days on other roads.

But the climax came Wednesday morning on returning from Ripley for the big reunion at Ravenswood when nearly 300 passengers were crammed into this one coach, not a half of whom could have seats. But my surprise came when upon asking what small individual owned the road, that he could not afford at least one more coach, the reply came that he was the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad Company, and had never furnished but the one coach.

Now for a few words concerning the reunion itself. It was the most largely attended of any of the many previous ones at that place. The speakers in part consisted of such men as the Hon. H. H. Moss, representative in Congress from the Fourth district; Judge W. H. O'Brien, W. A. Parsons, and our own Stuart F. Reed, secretary of state. It is needless for me to say that Mr. Reed gave us one of his usual masterpieces for grammatical and poetical skill in the whole composition of the various sentences that made up his most elaborate address. In rhetoric or composition, Mr. Reed is without a peer in any part of our land. The address of Judge Moss was also fine, but the most of it was directed along the line of his fad, the good roads proposition. I am sorry I could not remain over Thursday to hear Governor Hatfield and other prominent speakers who are scheduled on today's program. It was generally remarked that this assembly displayed the most sensible dressed crowd of women, who were shy on split shirts or hobbles.
