DECOY TRUNK GETS HIM

trunk. When it had been delivered to him, Captain Campbell approached him and asked him whether that was his trunk. Fragon claimed ownership in a positive manner, whereupon the captain told him he was under arrest. The officers took the man to the county jail on the next train and are having him detained there until a further investigation of the case is made.

Captain Campbell swore out a search warrant in Justice T. G. Nicewarner's court Friday and accompanied with a constable and another member of the railroad police force, went to Doila in the afternoon for the purpose of recovering other missing trunks, suit cases and valises believed to have been checked thither by Fragon or possibly other members of the suspected band.

Inasmuch as the trunk was a subject of interstate commerce and as it is believed other stolen baggage had also been checked into other states, it is likely that the federal authorities will take a hand in the case. Captain Campbell will confer with them as

soon as his investigation warrants such action.
