

**PRESIDENT**

And Many Congressmen Will Go to Southern Commercial Congress.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 12.—President Wilson and a large number of senators, representatives and delegates to the fifth annual convention of the Southern Commercial Congress at Mobile, Ala., October 27-29, will travel from Washington to Mobile in a train de luxe, to be known as the "President's Special." Southern railway officials are now arranging for this train, which will be the finest that ever traveled over the tracks of the Southern railway.

Starting in Washington, sections will be added to this train on its way to Mobile, at the principal cities of the South, where delegates to the convention will join the "President's Special." Sections will join the train with delegates at Danville, Va., Greensboro, N. C., Spartanburg, S. C., Atlanta, Ga., Montgomery, Ala., and other cities. It is expected that when the "President's Special" reaches Mobile, several thousand delegates from this part of the United States alone will have made the trip.

In view of the fact that about ten thousands delegates from the sixteen southern states, besides representatives from other states of the Union, Canada, and the Pan-American Republics, will attend this Mobile convention, the Southern Passenger Association has made a one-fare round trip rate from all points in the Southern states to the convention.

**FOR TEN DAYS**

Wilsonburg Man Suspected of Being Crazy Will Be Held in Jail.

Resulting from his examination under lunacy proceedings in Magistrate T. G. Nicewarner's court, William Tate, of Wilsonburg, is to be held for ten days in the county jail for observation. Insanity was not established at the hearing but the evidence adduced was such as to warrant the justice in holding him for observation.

The examination lasted for nearly two days and was finished late Thursday. Between thirty and forty witnesses were examined.

**WOMEN**

Are to Gather in the South Soon in Very Large Numbers.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 12.—The greatest gathering ever held by women of the South will occur October 27-29, at the fifth annual meeting of the Southern Commercial Congress to be held in Mobile, Ala., on that date, when the Woman's Auxiliary of the Southern Commercial Congress will hold its convention.

Mrs. Woodrow Wilson, wife of President Wilson, is the honorary president general of the woman's auxiliary, and Mrs. Thomas M. Owen, wife of Dr. Thomas M. Owen, of Montgomery, Ala., is president-general. Mrs. Owen is the daughter of Senator Bankhead, of Alabama. She is a noted club woman, writer, and one of the most brilliant women in the South. Mrs. William E. Martin, of Montgomery, Ala., is secretary of the auxiliary.

President Wilson will be the principal speaker at the Mobile convention of the Southern Commercial Congress, and Mrs. Wilson probably will accompany him and participate in the woman's auxiliary convention.

Among the noted women who will speak at the woman's auxiliary convention are Lady Aberdeen of Ireland, who will talk on "Rural Life and Co-operation in Europe"; Miss Jane Addams, of Hull House, Chicago, whose theme will be "The Home and Social Welfare"; Miss Julia Lathrop, superintendent of the Children's Bureau of Washington, D. C., who will deliver an address on "Child Welfare."

Mrs. Pennybacker, president general of the Federation of Women's Clubs of America, will speak on "The Club Woman," and Mrs. M. Mrs. Emmet O'Neal, wife of Governor O'Neal of Alabama, will deliver the address of welcome to the delegates to the convention, who will number several thousand leading women of the South.


