## THE THEATERS

When the play opens he is dollarless, but has the reputation of being a millionaire. To recoup his fortune he decided to marry a rich old widow, a determination which his friend Wallace is advising him against. At this point the news arrives that a kind uncle has died and left him the other half of the chewing gum factory. Wallace offers to buy him out, but instead offers to buy him out, but instead of selling he goes to the little Connecticut town where his factory is located, and there meets his fate in the pretty bookkeeper of the concern who was also his uncle's private secretary, and "Broadway" Jones is transformed into "Jackson" Jones, of Jonesville, for the rest of his happy life.

The rapid fire dialogue of this comedy is said to be wonderful, the audience catches the enthusiasm with which Mr. Cohan has imbued his hero, and the applause is constant and inspiring. In fact there is a laugh almost every minute in "Broadway Jones."

Out of the misfortunes of ex-Lieutenant Charles Becker, the death of the gambler Rosenthal, and the subsequent upheavals in the police department, at least half a dozen American playwrights have quarried half a dozen plays and as many fortunes. Whatever else one may think of him, everybody must yield Mr. Becker first place as this season's mightiest influence on the native drama. "Within the Law," to mention

the first new Klaw and Erlanger musical production of the new season, has scored a very decided success. It is based on the comedy "Narrentanz" by Leo Birinski and the leading role, that of a Spanish provincial governor, is played by Maclyn Arbuckle.

This is declared to be one of the best shows ever seen in a vaudeville house in the city.
