**CROP NEWS FOR ALL THE STATES**

Service to Be Extended by the Federal Department of Agriculture.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Nov. 6.—As a result of requests from editors and editorial associations in many states, the United States Department of Agriculture has announced that the November crop reports for each state will be supplied to the newspapers in all states through the Central Weather Station located in each of the states.

This is an extension of the experiment of telegraphing the state crop returns to the Central Weather Stations in each of nine states, and having these telegrams duplicated at once and mailed to the newspapers and agricultural publications. Under this plan newspapers in thirty-nine additional states will now receive full details of the state crops far more quickly than would be possible if these state crop details were put in the mails in Washington and had to travel by train long distances to the more remote states.

Under this plan the general summary of the crops for the United States of the crops for the United States in Washington for telegraphic distribution. It has been found, however, that the conditions of crops within their particular states are of especial value to the farmers and producers, to whom the conditions in their own state are important in the marketing of their produce.

Under this plan the department sends one telegram to the Central Weather Bureau in each state, and within a few minutes after the crop figures for the state are completed in Washington the Weather Bureau is enabled to mail copies of the figures from a central point within the state to all papers in that state.

Under the code system used, the figures of previous crops for comparison are supplied to each weather bureau station by mail. The cost of the telegram for each state does not exceed seventy-five cents. The crop data thus circulated by mail to the newspapers will give: (a) a full list of the crops; (b) the average condition of each crop for ten-year periods in that particular state; (c) the condition of the state crops for November 9. In the adjoining column will be given the same data for the United States, so that the farmers who read these notices can compare the crops in their states as of November 9 with the ten-year averages of their own state, and in the same way with the average condition throughout the United States on November 9 and for ten years.

These state crop reports are not supplied to individuals, and are mailed only to editors of regular publications. The November state crop report for the thirty-nine states newly added to the list will be sent only to daily papers, the county seat papers, and agricultural publications. Meanwhile, the department is preparing lists of small-town weeklies, and in December the crop reports will be sent also to the smaller papers.

**JAR OF COFFEE**  
With a History in the Office of United States Senator Chilton.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Nov. 6.—There is in Senator Chilton's office in the Capitol a small jar of coffee which has a history. It is a portion of a package of fifteen pounds of coffee which was hidden in the garret of James A. Rudall's home at Culpepper, Va., in 1862, when Union soldiers were entering the village. After the army had departed the coffee was forgotten and remained in its hiding place until 1912 when it was discovered by workmen who were putting electric wires into the house. Notwithstanding the fact that it was stored away for fifty years the coffee retains its odor and looks as though it would still make a delicious drink. The coffee was brought to Senator Chilton's office by Major F. M. Burrows, of Culpepper.

**WORK RESUMED**  
On the Grafton Postoffice after a Retaining Wall Contract is Let to Grafton Man.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 6.—Work on the Grafton postoffice, which has been delayed, will be permitted to go on soon as the result of the letting of the contract for the construction of a retaining wall on the property, Congressman Sutherland interested himself in having the letting of the contract hastened so as not to delay the work on the building. A Grafton man secured the contract and will push the work.
