Altitudes in West Virginia. Engineers and surveyors who need to have accurately determined points from which to start surveys of any kind find the spirit-leveling bulletins published by the United States Geological Survey of considerable value.

In 1909 and 1910 the Geological Survey, in cooperation with the State of West Virginia, established more than 500 datum points in that State, the work being done under the direction of R. B. Marshall, chief geographer of the Geological Survey.
