## CITY A LEADER IN GREAT CRUSADE

Ahead of All West Virginia Cities in Sale of Red Cross Holiday Stamps.

Clarksburg in all likelihood led all cities of West Virginia in the sale of Red Cross holiday stamps, the proceeds of which are devoted to the anti-tuberculosis crusade. Facts regarding the sales here and the amount of those conducting them are given in the following statement to the public by Mrs. John L. Euhl, agent for the West Virginia Anti-Tuberculosis League:  
 "Those who had charge of the sale of Red Cross seals in Clarksburg just prior to the holidays desire to express their thanks for the courtesy, help and patronage so generously given.  
 "The whole amount derived from the sale was \$702.09. Deducting \$118.60 which has been forwarded to the state Anti-Tuberculosis League, and forty-nine cents, which represents the total operating expense there remains for the local work \$583.50.  
 "Our citizens will be glad to know that, though the figures are not yet all in, it is probable that Clarksburg leads all West Virginia cities in the proportion of its sales to its population, with the city of Charleston a

close second.  
 "Sincere thanks are tendered the newspapers which gave the sale publicity; the merchants who, at much inconvenience gave space in their stores during the busy holiday season and were themselves, in many cases, generous patrons of the sale; the volunteer saleswomen who were faithful in their work, and those who purchased the seals."
