 During these intervals his wife assumed the direction of affairs and continued to entertain or be entertained. Her energy and resource seemed inexhaustible. Soon she became the special dictator of the city, and the most exclusive circles, American and Panamanian alike, allowed her to assume control.
 The result was just what had been designed. Tourists and visiting newspaper people spoke glowingly of the amity between the two nations and wondered at the absence of that Spanish prejudice of which they had heard so much. Those who chanced to know the deeper significance of it all and were aware of the smoldering resentment that lay in the Latin mind commented admiringly upon her work and wondered what effect it would have upon the coming election.
 No one but the woman herself and her husband really understood the tremendous difficulties of their task or the vital issues at stake. All who came into contact with her recognized the master mind directing the campaign and, consciously or unconsciously, relegated her husband to the background.

To the Latin intellect this display of power on the part of the woman was a revelation. She knew the effect she produced and made the most of it.
 Old Anibal Alvarez was perhaps the last fully to appreciate her. He did, however, learn in time that while he could successfully match his craft against that of the husband, the wife read him unerringly. The result was that he broke with them openly.
 When news of this reached the members of the canal commission they were alarmed, and Colonel Jolson felt it necessary to make known their views upon the situation. NEW GUSHER
 In the Sardis District Oil Field is Showing Good Staying Qualities.

The new gusher in the Gordon sand territory in Sardis district, this county, is showing very creditable staying qualities. The second twenty-four hours after it was drilled into the pay it placed 550 barrels to its credit. The farm, J. T. Lanham's—on which the well is located seems to be located in the richest portion of the pool. The old No. 2 on the same farm, drilled in more than three months ago is still producing 100 barrels a day. J. T. Miller & Company, the owners of the lease have made a lucky find.

RED LIGHT
 District in City of Huntington May Be Restored by Action of Commissioners.

HUNTINGTON, W. Va., Jan. 28.—After the introduction of a resolution at a meeting of the board of commissioners ordering a police investigation to determine whether or not the city had been benefited by the abolition of the red light section, it was given out that the majority of board members are in favor of returning to segregation of disorderly houses.
 County Prosecutor Henry Simms on being informed of the intended action of the city commission by the city council, declared that in case the board authorized the existence of a red light section the members would be liable to indictment. Members of the board of commissioners declare the abatement of the red light section has precipitated a condition more serious than has ever been known before in Huntington, and that houses are scattered even in the best resident sections.

THREW ROCKS
 Through Windows of G. A. Elk House Did Kirk Watson's Shot in Jail.

A man giving his name as Kirk Watson was arrested on Clark street this afternoon by Police Officer William Post and held in the city jail on a charge of disorderly conduct. It is alleged that Watson went to the home of his former wife, from whom he is divorced, and attempted to see her. When she refused to see him he became infuriated and threw rocks through the windows of the house. A telephone call brought the officer to the scene. The man will be tried before Mayor Will H. Cole in police court Thursday morning.
