OPEN BY LOCAL FOLK SPLENDID BUFFALO

Nickels Are Not Imitations But Are Improved Coinage of the Country.

WHEELING, Feb. 3.—As so much comment has been caused by the influx of a strange five-cent piece in the city, and the exclusive articles of The Register calling attention to the coin, the following from the February issue of the National Coinage Director will be of much interest: "Much comment has been caused throughout the country because the government has coined two widely different buffalo nickels of the same design and the same date. Street railway companies, five and ten-cent stores, department stores and other large handlers of small coins have besieged the United States secret service agencies and the sub-treasurer with reports of a supposed counterfeit buffalo nickel. We have had many inquiries as to whether the new nickel is counterfeit or not. "The first coinage of the 1913 nickel bore the date of 1913, with its distinctive lettering and rather blurred lines, and beside it was exhibited the coin that was called counterfeit, with its sharp and distinct lines and lettering. The difference was immediately noticeable, and because before the date of the new coin was issued the new coin was counterfeit. The new nickel is genuine. "Many banks have accumulated thousands of these supposedly counterfeit nickels and have shipped them to the secret service offices or to the treasury and sub-treasurer. "There has been great confusion throughout the country, and all because the treasury department tried to improve upon the first buffalo nickels coined. The first coins were rather indistinct in their outlines. The buffalo did not seem to be standing on anything. The Five Cents under the buffalo was blurred and indistinct. "New dies were made, embodying all the art of the first design, but making the 'Five Cents' stand out much more clearly, giving the buffalo a more distinct line between the prairie scene and the wording. The die of the buffalo was cut deeper and more distinctly, and on the other side of the coin the Indian head was made to stand out in sharper relief. "These new nickels have been out only a short time and the difference has been noted throughout the country to such an extent that most persons believe the improved coin to be a counterfeit. There has been no counterfeit of the buffalo nickel. All are genuine. The counterfeit coins are gathering the old and indistinct coins and will hold them for an increase in value."

BRIDGEPORT

Are Paid State by Corporations Doing Business in State of West Virginia. CHARLESTON, Feb. 3.—A little over four and one-half million dollars is the balance to the credit of the state with the closing of business January 31, as shown by the reports of the state treasurer and state auditor. Of this balance \$3,998,854 belongs to the state and into which funds were paid during the month of January \$3,180,320.21. This large amount came from the public service corporations. The workmen's compensation fund shows a balance of \$184,161.20. During the month of January the receipts to this fund were \$7,776.15, and the expenditures \$6,888.54. The receipts, however, were principally taken advantage of the workmen's compensation act. The concerns that had taken advantage of the law during the latter part of the year will not have to pay their January portion to the fund until after the middle of the February. This amount of money received by the fund during the month of January. The balance in the several funds at the close of business January 31, was as follows: State fund, \$3,998,854.55; workmen's compensation fund, \$184,161.20; general school fund, \$3,998,854.55; and the independent school fund, \$1,000,000. The disbursements from the general school fund for the month was \$179,823.46, and from the state fund \$223,744.30.
