Is Wagner's Opera "Parsifal" Placed by the Higher Roman Catholic Clergy.

BERLIN, Mar. 18—Higher Roman Catholic clergy of Bohemia and Moravia have placed Wagner's opera, "Parsifal," under a ban. While bishops from those two countries were holding their recent eucharistic congress at Prague, Austria, the National theater proposed a gala performance of "Parsifal" in honor of the visiting prelates. The latter voted not to accept the invitation on the ground that certain scenes in the opera were immoral and offensive to Roman Catholics.
