


Who Will Probably Wear a Clarksburg Uniform This Season—Wins Game.

LExINGTON, Va., April 10.—West Virginia succeeded in doing something Thursday afternoon that Wesleyan failed to do; that of defeating the strong Virginia Military Institute team, by the score of 5 to 4.

The game proved to be one of the most exciting ever witnessed here and was won in the ninth inning by "Sally" Ayres, a recruit from Morris-Harvey, who hit for a home run. West Virginia fielded loosely, due, largely, to stage fright, this being the first game of the season.

"Lefty" Barron pitched air tight all the way and was in hot water only when the infield wavered in the opening innings. West Virginia left last night for Williamsburg, Va., to play two games with William and Mary College. The team is in fine shape and unless there is a decided change in the playing of the nine something better than an even break will be secured on the road trip. The score:

Mr. Mackinnon was very much pleased with the treatment accorded him by the fans here and he is elated over the baseball prospects in this city. President Mackinnon will visit Charles Connellville and Uniontown before returning to his home in McKeesport.

Manager Shannon announces the signing of Frank McCarthy, a pitcher hailing from Canton, O. McCarthy worked in the O. and P. League when Mr. Shannon was in that circuit and the local pilot knows what he can do. McCarthy is a big, husky lad and possesses everything that goes to make a successful pitcher. He has plenty of speed and a good curve ball.

The Uniontown club announces the signing of several players, Charles Defters, an infielder of Wheeling, W. Va. This man has played in three O. and P. Leagues, and is said to be a very promising youngster. William Houser, a third sacker, and Harry Beeson, a shortstop for the Pittsburg Federals last season, have also been corralled.

The Calontown management states that the new ball park in that city will be one of the best minor league plants in the country. H. C. Frick, the Pittsburg millionaire, has donated the grounds and stands and will see that everything is placed in tip-top shape before the players report the latter part of this month.

Jimmy Mack, the boss of the Cokers, has secured the following: A. R. Flagg, a pitcher from Cranford, N. J., and A. H. Archibald, a catcher who formerly worked in the Texas league. Archibald was with the Buffalo International League club on the training trip last spring and turned over to Dallas for development. He was unable to stand the hot southern climate and returned to his Pennsylvania home in mid-season. Manager Mack is depending upon him to work regularly, behind the plate for Connellville.

HOOKWORM STORY
About Coal Miners is Not Believed by Governor and He Orders Investigation.

CHARLESTON, April 10.—Governor Hatfield, himself a physician who left active practice to become chief executive of West Virginia, today declared he does not believe the people of the Pocahontas coal field are affected with hookworm as charged by Dr. W. C. Stiles, of the federal health service in a report to Washington and ordered the bacteriological department of the University of West Virginia to make a thorough investigation.

The governor practiced medicine for a number of years in the counties covered by Dr. Stiles' report but before making public his views he consulted a number of practitioners in the county composing the Pocahontas field, all of whom, it is said, agreed with the governor.

ANOTHER REDUCTION.
BAIRTLISVILLE, Okla., April 10.—Announcement was made here today that the Tapsline Company in Oklahoma-Kansas fields had reduced the price of crude oil from \$1 to 95 cents per barrel. This reduction is the second this week.
