LIBERTY SATIN BLOUSE.



The yellow shades are so fashionable this season that nothing better could be selected for this blouse than delicate lemon color trimmed with black and white silk.

Today's home dressmaking lesson shows one of the fashionable new waists for summer. It may be carried out most effectively in liberty satin, very pale yellow being especially pretty. The vest looks well in narrow black and white striped silk. The waist is built upon a fitting lining, which requires about a yard of 36-inch material.

For the waist proper about two yards of 36-inch satin will be sufficient, and this comes at a yard and upward. Three-quarters of a yard of striped silk will be required for the vest, or wide ribbon may be used instead. The sleeves may be long or short, and the neck is finished with a round turnover collar.

ed by triple "TTT" perforations on a lengthwise fold of the material. These are the front and back yoke (F), the collars (H) and (D), respectively, and the applied back. The outer front (E), vest and cuffs, (C) and (J), are pinned on a lengthwise thread of the goods. There are one or two ways in which the neck can be finished. For a V shaped neck cut out the neck edges of underbody front and back on single small "o" perforations and follow this same rule in the case of the sleeve, if elbow length is desired. If the lining is carefully put together it will not require any alteration. Fac the front and back from neck edges to double "oo" perforations. Now adjust the vest to position on the front of the waist; fit to see that it is smooth and even. Close under-arm seams as notched; then close the shoulder seam. Her the front as notched; then sew on the standing collar if this is to be used instead of the low neck. Now gather the front, at the upper edge where it is to be attached to the edge of back and long sleeve between double "TT" perforations. Sew front to yoke as notched; place the sleeves in position, according to notches; then sew in armhole. Close under-arm, sleeve and cuff seams as notched. Tuck the sleeves following markings, attached 1/2 inch or less from folded edges; finish the neck—adding collar—and prepare to arrange on the lining. At the back there is an applied pleat, and this must be gathered and adjusted to the outer back as indicated. Put on the lining, fit again and finish. The buttons are added last of all, save the girdle.

CAN SERVE LIQUORS TO GUESTS IN HOME

To Guests Just as Freely as One Serves Coffee Now to Them Says Blue.

In response to an inquiry, State Tax Commissioner Blue has settled a much mooted controversy regarding the new prohibition laws effective in West Virginia after July 1, whether one may in his home treat his friends to intoxicating liquors. Mr. Blue answers the question in the affirmative. His reply in full is as follows: "As to giving liquor to a guest, there is nothing in the law that prevents one in his private home giving liquor to a guest in the same social way he serves coffee, water, milk, bread, or meat, provided that in no way, shape or form it is a guise or scheme, or intended to be, for the sale, barter or trade of liquors by the host to the guest. Any attempt to give liquor to a guest as a scheme or device to affectuate a sale is, of course, a violation of the law. Must Not Be Distributing Place. "Again, if one in his own home undertakes to use, distribute, or permit to be used or distributed, with or to any person, liquors which he and other persons have jointly purchased or jointly acquired, thereby making the home a distributing place for such liquor, such use, purchase and distribution would be a violation of section 6, which prohibits persons associating with one another in the buying and distribution of liquors and both would be subject to penalties provided by law. "Now, as to the fishing camp question, it seems to me the law is clear that one to keep liquors on his own premises must keep them there for his own lawful use. He cannot associate himself with another in keeping liquors at his home or elsewhere. He cannot acquire jointly with another and then to distribute such liquor, regardless of where they are distributed, is a violation of the law. "Guest" and "Visitor." A question was propounded to me while I was at the auditorium in Wheeling, like this: "Can one give liquor to a member of his family? Can one give liquor to a visitor?"

My answer to that part of the question, whether one can give liquor to a member of his family, was in the affirmative. Of course, by "family," I meant his own immediate family. Answering that part of the question, whether one may give liquor to a visitor, I answered that he would do so at his peril. There is a distinction between guest"—a guest in good faith, in the sense of the term as I have used it, and the term "visitor," as one who calls to get liquor, or goes for such purposes. Certainly he who gives liquor to such visitor acts at his extreme peril, and the burden will all ways be upon him to show his good faith in the transaction and that the same was entirely free from (a) keeping of liquors at his home for unlawful purposes, and (b) that the giving was in good faith to a person not under disability and not for the purpose of in any way evading any provision of the law. I have tried to construe the law in this manner as I believe it to be, and hope I have made myself clear. If I have not, I shall be glad to answer any other questions you may want to ask."

BELCHER TO ENTER RACE FOR CONGRESS

Against Adam Littlepage in the Third District of This State.

CHARLESTON, April 20.—Interest in the contest for the Democratic nomination for Congress in the Third district is greatly increased by the announcement that Attorney A. M. Belcher, of this city, has decided to enter the race. Belcher is a young attorney who served a term in the House of Delegates from Kanawha county and gave his support to the election of Clarence W. Watson and William E. Chilton as United States senators. He later gained some prominence by becoming one of the attorneys for the United Mine Workers of America, being associated with Harold W. Houston, the Socialist, at the time. Belcher's activity in behalf of the miners won for him a wide reputation as a lawyer for a young man.

The entry of Belcher has caused some uneasiness among the followers of ex-Congressman Adam B. Littlepage who is expected to announce his candidacy almost any time. Followers of Littlepage also received a jolt recently when Attorney Vernon C. Champe, of Montgomery, began covering the district with letters to ascertain whether his candidacy would be seriously considered if formally announced. Champe calls from Fayette county, where Littlepage received such a flattering vote from the miners when he broke the chain of victories that had been following Joseph Holt Gaines, and became the first Democrat to represent the Third congressional district for more than a dozen years.

Belcher's entrance into the race, carrying with it the persistency and fighting qualities he has displayed in legal battles during the last two years, means a contest of more than ordinary interest in Kanawha county to decide whether old Kanawha favors Belcher or Littlepage.
