THRIFT HABIT COMMENDED BY EX-BOOTBLACK

He is Now a Congressman and Wealthy but Supports National Society's Objects.

WASHINGTON, D. C., May 5.—"When I was a little bit of a kid, there was such a tragedy in my life the very day I used to sit on the bank of stream at noon and weep bitter tears. The tragedy was caused by the fact that my shoes had so many holes in them that I could not join the other boys in the sport of using their shoes for boats on the stream. Theirs floated, and mine wouldn't."

This is a reminiscence called up by Representative James Francis Burke, member of Congress from Pennsylvania, who has come out with a strong endorsement of the work of the American Society for Thrift, with the object of promoting economy among all classes of people.

Peculiarly appropriate. Burke's support of the society is peculiarly appropriate because of the fact that his wonderful career and eminent success have been the results of his industry, his habits of thrift, and his appreciation of the value of money. At this time Burke, who is still a young man, is not only one of the most influential members of the National House, but is also a wealthy man and enjoys a tremendous law practice in the city of Pittsburgh.

He began his life's work when he was hardly more than a yard high and started out as a boot-black. By saving his money he graduated into the business of selling newspapers. His industry and his economy, and particularly his willingness to do any sort of work, finally resulted in his getting hold of enough cash to buy the law books necessary for his legal education. He worked by day and studied by night, and at last branched out as a young lawyer with a whole lot of ambition which he was certain would fulfill and a great deal of hunger which it was hard for him to satisfy. In the end, however, he made good.

Lesson From Life.

In commenting on Mr. Burke's career as a lesson to every American boy, Simon W. Strauss, of Chicago, president of the American Society for Thrift, says:

"The lives of such men as Mr. Burke are the greatest models lessons in thrift. If the average boy will learn habits of economy and thrift, he will learn also that scarcely anything in life is beyond his reach. This is the lesson that our nation and the individuals of our nation must learn. The national extravagance, which is now a national vice, must be curtailed."

MORE ANIMALS CAN BE GRAZED

On National Forests According to Figures of Secretary of Agriculture.

WASHINGTON, May 5.—Figures showing the number of live stock for which the secretary of agriculture has authorized grazing permits for the ranges on the 160 national forests during the year 1914 have just been made public. Nearly eleven million animals can be grazed, including nearly two million head of cattle and horses, nearly nine million head of sheep and goats, and about 65,000 hogs.

Big Increase.

This means an increase for the current year of about 38,000 more cattle and horses, and 347,000 more sheep and goats, although the gross area of the national forests at the beginning of 1914 is almost a million acres less than at the beginning of 1913.

During 1913, according to the reports just compiled, more than 27,000 stockmen paid the government for grazing permits on the national forests.

For several years past the carrying capacity of the national forest ranges has been slowly rising, which, forest officers say, indicates an improvement in general grazing conditions and a better utilization of the forage resources. They claim that this is due mainly to the enforcement of better methods of distributing and handling stock.

New Method is Favored.

On the lands recently acquired by the federal government within the Appalachian region of the east, regulated grazing has been undertaken this year on six different areas. The local stock owners who had previously used the land under lease from the former owners have readily accepted the change of ownership and appear to be favorably impressed with the methods employed by the forest service for grazing purposes. While the number of all animals authorized to graze upon these southern Appalachian forests is not large, it is the belief of the forest officers in charge of them that under careful supervision the lands will support more stock than they have in the past and that there will be considerable improvement in the individual animals, with a constant increase in meat production.

WOMAN STEEPLEJACK.

SMOKES BIG CIGARS.

Kaiser Wilhelm of Germany takes a keen delight in smoking huge Havana cigars almost seven inches long, of which he scarcely ever fails to smoke less than ten a day. He pays about \$50 a hundred for these, so that to satisfy his craving for the "spitting weed," he has annually to foot a bill amounting to something more than \$1,000.


