BUCKHANNON

(SPECIAL CORRESPONDENCE)
BUCKHANNON, May 14.—The committee chosen to select a suitable site for the new Pythian home will come to Buckhannon to look over some ground about the eighteenth of this month. They will consider the farms of C. F. Jackson, H. B. Marshall, the Rev. P. S. Strader and the Hon. William Post. The committee was here early in the spring but as the snow was on the ground they very wisely put off a selection until this month. Seventy-five acres is required for the grounds and if the farms named cover that much the choice will surely fall on one of them as we are sure that no other spot in the state is more beautiful or more suitable, because these farm shave always been under the care of very intelligent owners. The Hon. W. B. Cutright is now out in the county visiting all the Pythian homes and informs us that he is meeting with great success along financial lines. Buckhannon has offered \$10,000 to get the home located here and the whole amount is about subscribed for and the rest can easily be raised before the time it will be asked for in case the location should be chosen here. The final decision will be made May 20, when the Home board meets at Fairmont.

A booster train decorated with the Pythian colors and filled with local boosters will run to Fairmont from this place. The establishment of the home means a final home for all old and indigent members of the Pythian order, all widows and unmarried sisters, and the orphans of the Knights of Pythias.

The public schools will close Friday, May 2. The annual baccalaureate sermon before the high school class will be delivered by the Rev. G. W. Pollock Sunday evening at the high school auditorium. The Farnsworth medal will be awarded at the contest for the best recitation Tuesday evening, May 19. There will be seven contestants for this prize and all of them have very good talent. The W. C. T. U. has offered a prize for the best essay written on total abstinence which will be awarded at the same time with the gold and silver medals offered by the dental firm of Talbot and Farnsworth for the best essay on oral hygiene and the three medals offered by the ministerial union of this city for the best manuscript on "The Life of Christ." The senior class exercises and the senior class play have been set for Wednesday night. The annual commencement exercises will be held Thursday evening, when the Hon. J. Frank Marsh will deliver an address to the graduating class. The other numbers on the program will consist of special music and the presentation of diplomas.
