FOUNTAIN

Locations as Made by Association are Approved With Two Exceptions.

At Friday evening's meeting of the city council, the street committee made favorable report of the location of drinking fountains and watering troughs as made by the Water Fountain Association with two exceptions and the report was adopted. The committee reported it inadvisable to locate a fountain at Fourth and West Pike streets owing to congested street conditions and it stated that the city had no authority to have one at the traction station.
A proposal of citizens of West Locust street to furnish brick for paving that street from Peck street to the western limits of the city, conditioned upon the city's furnishing the other material and having the work done, was referred to the street committee for report.
The matter of providing a building suitable for housing the street sprinkler, two hose reels, street tools and 500 feet of hose asked for by the street superintendent was referred to the street committee.
The street pay roll, \$182,50, the last two weeks was ordered paid.
W. B. Virgil and Company's bill of \$556.50 for street paving was ordered paid.
The council refused to re-open the alleged contest of Roscoe C. Brown for W. B. Conaway's seat in council.
Dr. Fleming Howell's demand for more rent for the city police building was referred to the mayor and city clerk.
D. W. Jacob's proposal to pave Monticello avenue between his apartment house and the street car track there, conditioned upon the city's placing the curb was referred to the street committee.

FEMALE

School Teachers Can be Married after Contract as Teachers is Entered Into.

CHARLESTON, May 16.—Marriage of a female school teacher after having been so appointed or elected by a board of education in West Virginia is not of itself good ground for revocation by such board of its action or the abrogation of its contract, is the holding of the supreme court in the case of Jameson vs. the Board of Education of Union district, Marshall county, when the higher court reversed the judgment of the court below and itself entered the judgment. The opinion of the court was by President Miller as follows:
"The statute not requiring it, contracts with teachers when appointed by boards of education need not be in writing," says the opinion, and adds "Where a teacher who has taught the previous year makes verbal application to the president of the board of education for re-appointment, upon the same fixed and definite terms as the previous year, and is assured by him of her re-appointment, and thereafter at a regular meeting of the board at which he is present and participating and when all other teachers of the district are duly elected or appointed, such teacher is in fact re-elected or appointed to such position on such terms, such action of the board amounts to acceptance of the offer and completes a valid contract between the parties irrevocable by such board except for causes prescribed by statute.
"And if after such reappointment or election to such position of teacher," continues the opinion, "verbal notice is given the president by such teacher of his or her acceptance thereof, such notice is notice to the board; and on the theory that such election or appointment constitutes a mere proposal by the board, such notice to the president is likewise notice to the board, and constitutes acceptance of such offer by the teacher and completes a valid and binding contract, irrevocable except for causes prescribed by the statute."

Conley, to succeed Roy Reed, resigned; at Kiline, Pendleton county, A. J. Heavener, to succeed Arthur N. Judy, resigned; at Saltpetre, Wayne county, George W. Montgomery, to succeed Allen Thornhill, resigned; at Pocotaligo, Kanawha county, Marion C. Morecott, to succeed John M. Derrick; at Webb, Wayne county, Sherman Parsley, to succeed Stanley Chaffin; at Wymer, Randolph county, James W. White, to succeed Aaron Teter; at Craigville, Nicholas county, William H. Spencer, to succeed Guy S. Q. Ward; at Orma, Calhoun county, Harper R. Burns, to succeed William A. Shoemaker.


