DECIDING GAME For State Collegiate Championship Will Be Played at Fairmont Monday.



In the past Clarksburg has always drawn Fairmont on all athletic contests between Wesleyan and West Virginia and it appears that the West Virginia University faculty want the baseball team to play for expenses instead of making money when they refuse to allow the game to be played in this city.

BASEBALL An Old Game, Being First Played as a College Game in 1825.

Do you know how baseball began? This is one of the questions that sometimes comes to the editor. Well, so far as the best opinion goes nowadays it is a purely original American game, first called "One Old Cat" and was among the popular college sports as far back as 1825. The first regularly organized baseball club of record was the Knickerbocker of New York City, first playing the game, on a lot which is now the site of Madison Square Garden, in 1842. This club became a permanent organization and formulated the first playing rules of the game on September 23, 1845. One very popular version of baseball amusement nowadays is the Daily Telegram's Summer Pastime.

SUFFRAGE Sentiment is Fast Growing in the Southern States, Says Georgia Woman.

WASHINGTON, June 4.—Things are moving swiftly these days in the Sunny South. Word has been received by Mrs. Helen H. Gardener, member of the National Congressional Committee, from Mrs. Emily C. McDougall, chairman of the Georgia Equal Suffrage Party with headquarters in Atlanta of the great impetus recently felt in the Southern states caused by the amazing growth of suffrage sentiment. Mrs. McDougall speaks enthusiastically of the Shafroth amendment and states it to be her belief that its passage would work wonders particularly in the south-land. The Honorable Edward Taylor, of Colorado, made a magnificent address before the House on the question of equal suffrage, and it has proven to be the most forceful and enlightening public utterance delivered in years. Already more than four hundred thousand copies of his able presentation of woman's cause have been sent broadcast over the country, being used with marked effect in the campaign states and being responsible it is claimed for the carrying of the states of Kansas into the suffrage column.

Chief Justice Walter Clark of North Carolina is another ardent advocate of the enfranchisement of women whose efforts are meeting with unqualified success. His speeches have proven so valuable a judicial exposition of the rights of women as citizens, and his learned citations and legal arguments have had such far reaching and unanswerable effect that Mrs. McDougall and other officers of the society in Georgia have determined to circulate the legislature. It is planned to have a constituent send a copy of Justice Clark's speeches to each member of the state legislature. Mrs. Helen H. Gardener's wonderfully able little brochure "Which Way" is also greatly in demand for when the Reverend Anna Howard Shaw, the president of the National American Woman Suffrage Association, down to the humblest worker in the ranks suffragists in America recognize the fact that the great desideratum at this time is education. Having presented the justice of woman's claims clearly and convincingly they know that the manhood of America will then vindicate them.
