BROTHER

Of Miss Gertrude Reidler is Hurt in Motorcycle Accident Near Cumberland, Md.

Miss Gertrude Reidler, a clerk at Weber's flower store, has received word that her brother, Clarence M. Reidler, a clerk in the Second National Bank at Cumberland, Md., is a patient in a hospital there suffering from serious injuries received in a motorcycle accident on the National pike near that city. A young man attempted to mount the motorcycle Reidler was riding, causing the latter to lose his balance and the machine to fall against a moving trolley car that was passing at the time. Mr. Reidler had his right arm and right foot broken and a shoulder blade so badly crushed that part of the bone punctured a lung. He will recover. The other young man, Carl Herpich, escaped with minor bruises. The accident occurred Thursday night. Miss Reidler will go to her brother's bedside this evening.

FULL TEXT

(Continued from page one.)

First to last the fact that the suit was an ordinary one concerning a difference between individuals, but was a controversy between states involving grave questions of public law determinable by this court under the exceptional grant of power conferred upon it by the constitution, has been the guide by which every step and every conclusion hitherto expressed has been controlled. And we are of the opinion that this guiding principle should not now be lost sight of, to the end that when the case comes ultimately as it must in the absence of agreement between the parties, there may be no room for the slightest interference that the more restricted rules applicable to individuals have been applied to a great public controversy, or that anything but the largest justice after the amplest opportunity to be heard has in any degree entered into the disposition of the case. This conclusion, which we think is required by the duty owed to the moving state, also in our opinion operates no injustice to the opposing state, since it but affords an additional opportunity to guard against the possibility of error, and thus reach the result most consonant with the honor and dignity of both parties to the controversy.

"Because of these convictions, we therefore make the following order: "That the motion on the part of the state of West Virginia to file the supplemental answer be and the same is hereby granted; and that the amendments in such answer be and the same shall be considered as traversed by the state of Virginia; that the subject matter of the supplemental answer as traversed be at once referred for consideration and report to Charles E. Littlefield, Esq., the Master before whom the previous hearings were had, with directions to hear and consider such evidence and testimony as to the matters set forth in the supplemental answer as the state of West Virginia may deem advisable to proffer and such counter showing on the part of the state of Virginia as that state may deem advisable to make. The report on the subject to embrace the testimony so taken and the conclusion deduced therefrom as well as the views of the Master concerning the operation and effect of the proof thus offered, if

any, upon the principal sum found to be due by the previous decree of this court. Nothing in this order to vacate or change in any manner or in any particular the previous decree, and the same to stand wholly unaffected by the order now made or any action taken thereunder until the examination and report herein provided for is made and this court acts upon the same. It is further directed that the proceedings before the Master be so conducted as to secure a report on or before the second Monday of October, 1914."

Foreigner is Arrested on Serious Charge—Will Be Given Hearing Later.

Vesva Sipple was arrested by Constable Robert Noon Saturday morning on a warrant sworn out by Constable Chmelovich, charging Sipple with felonious assault. Concealment appeared before Justice Jackson V. Carter late Friday evening and swore out the warrant, and Sipple was arrested at his home at Farnum this morning and lodged in the county jail to await a hearing.
