By the German Socialists, Who Say the King Has Broken His Promise.

BERLIN, June 13.—The Socialists and other liberal parties in the Prussian Diet are protesting against "the long unkept promise of the King."

More than six years ago, the emperor, as King of Prussia, declared it to be his desire that a modern franchise system be established in the state to take the place of the existing three-class, non-secret ballot, which Bismarck once termed "the most iniquitous system in the world."

Since Chancellor von Buelow presented the king's desire to the Diet, only one attempt, and that wholly unsuccessful, has been made by the government to carry out the king's wishes. Minister von Loebell, the new incumbent of the ministry of the interior, now pronounces that he does not propose to present any measure this year for alteration of the voting system.

The liberal parties had hoped better things from von Loebell, who was von Buelow's right hand man when the latter was chancellor and who was in office when the king's wishes were made known to the Diet. The Conservatives are greatly pleased with von Loebell's stand, and the more so since they had feared possible liberal tendencies on his part.

CENTER OF GERMANY. BERLIN, June 13.—The little village of Crina, near Bittenfeld, has risen to distinction by an official survey showing it to be the geographical center of the German empire. The village proposes to set up a monument to proclaim the fact.

NEGROES ARE DISPOSSESSED

By Colonial Authorities at Duala and Reichstag Sustains the Action.

BERLIN, June 13.—The Reichstag has sustained the Colonial authorities in their recent dispossession of the negroes at Duala, the chief port of the German colony of Kamerun, in Africa, in order to make a modern sanitary city there. The protest of the negroes was at first received in Germany with sympathy, but Dr. Solf, secretary of the colonies, made such a convincing defense of the proceedings that the Reichstag passed the appropriation called for by a large majority, only the Socialists voting against it.

Another phase of the controversy has arisen. Recently the German Colonial government arrested Rudolf Bell, chief of the Duala, on a charge of treason. It is alleged that he went into the interior to foment an uprising against the Germans with a view to attaching Kamerun to the adjacent English colony, Nigeria.

In connection with this affair another arrest has just been made at Berlin. A native, sent by the Duala to Germany to present their case to the Reichstag, has been sent to prison, and it is understood he will be sent back to Kamerun for trial.

LUMBERPORT, June 13.—The Eagle district Progressive convention had political harmony and there will be united effort by all Republicans of Eagle district in maintaining their life-long record as Democratic "radicals."

Caleb Moore, of Wyatt, was nominated for justice of the peace; James S. Griffin, of Lumberport, for president of the board of education, and Casper Ashcraft, of Wyatt, for member of the school board.

GUY GOFF

Is Highly Complimented in the Prosecution of White Slavers at Milwaukee.

MILWAUKEE, June 13.—Judge Geiger in federal court has denied the motions for a new trial of counsel for James McGovern, Edward Stearns and Bernard Conway, convicted on a charge of violating the white slave law. McGovern was sentenced to three years in the federal prison at Leavenworth, Kas. Conway received a sentence of four months, and Stearns eight months, at the house of correction. The entire morning was devoted to arguments for a new trial.

When Judge Geiger had denied the motions for a new trial, and had imposed sentence on the convicted men, Attorney Henry Schmidt, who had defended Conway, arose and asked the court for permission to extend his court for permission to the United States government for the appointment of such an able lawyer as Guy D. Goff as United States district attorney for the eastern district of Wisconsin.

As Attorney Schmidt was in the midst of his eulogy, Judge Geiger smilingly interrupted him and suggested that the attorney extend his congratulations in writing to the department of justice at Washington.

THIRTEEN WITNESSES

In a Paris Murder Case Have Died Since Crime Was Committed.

PARIS, June 13.—Of thirty-three witnesses cited in a murder case which has just begun at Versailles, thirteen have died since the crime was committed thirteen years ago. The thirteen remaining will now be heard. The accused, Jean Louis Lous, had already been condemned to death by default, shortly after the murder, no trace of him being found at the time. He recently was arrested, having lived under an assumed name.
