On Rock Camp Run is Making Six Hundred Barrels Every Day.

On Little Rock Camp run, Sardis district, this county, the South Penn Oil Company's No. 5 on the J. A. Sprout farm has been drilled through the Gordon sand and is producing 600 barrels a day. In the same district the same company has completed its No. 6 on the S. R. Lanham farm and will not have better than a five barrel pumper. On Big Elk creek the Vesper Oil and Gas Company has completed No. 8 on the F. C. and C. W. Perry farm and has a twenty barrel producer. On Little Rock Camp run the Bendum-Tree Oil Company has drilled No. 5 on the Margie McIntyre farm through the Gordon and has a light gasser. At Wallace the Pine Grove Oil Company has drilled its test on the Omar E. Hall farm through the Gor-
